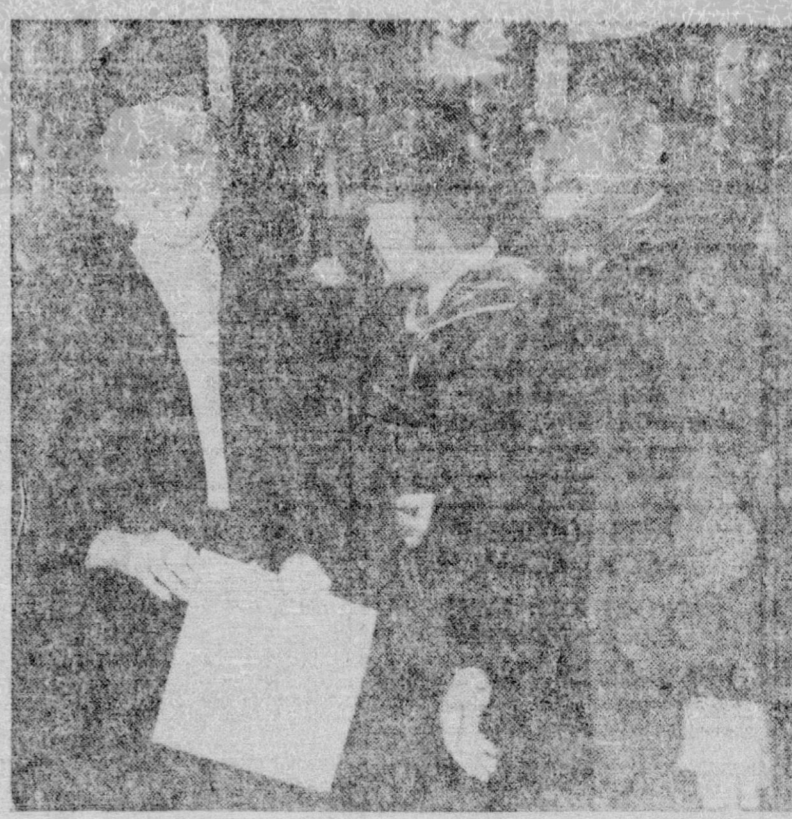
GOVERNMENT LOAN HELPS WILSON MAN BECOME FARM OWNER

WILSON, N. C. — When the Government made Clinton Ford, Wilson County tenant farmer, a small loan back in 1939 to buy some farm tools and for operating expenses he had no idea that 10 years he would own his own farm...

By thrift, hard work and friendly, unreserved credit Clinton and Augusta Ford have convinced their neighbors in the community that the farm they selected can produce at a profit and their efforts in becoming respected and substantial citizens have justified the faith of the county supervisor who believed they could make the grade...

When Mr. Ford applied for assistance from the Government his net worth was about \$275 not including a few household furnishings. When he paid off the final installment of his loan recently his net worth was \$9,114 and if the present year's crop is figured in the Fords will have a net worth of more than \$11,000 this fall.

Elaborating on the importance of education to American business, Mr. Atkins declared: "There is impressive evidence to show that the earning power, and therefore, the purchasing power of people tends to be geared to their level of education. A high school graduate at his peak earns 65 per cent more than a grade school graduate and the holder of an A. B. degree outstrips him by 250 per cent at his peak. Today 80 per cent of those in the highest income bracket are college trained."

BUSINESSMEN ARE URGED TO HELP UNCF DRIVE. In a special appeal to business men and industrialists, Frank W. Atkins, chairman, board of directors of the United Negro College Fund recently concluding its sixth annual nationwide campaign for a safe, sound investment...

Pointing out that nearly \$500 million in business corporations contributed to the Fund in 1948, Mr. Atkins declared in his statement: "Any investment in education is an investment in democracy, and only a democracy can free a people from the hopelessness of a slave system and make it stronger, we will be cultivating the greatest national resource, the people of America. And no one has a greater stake in the future of America than American Businessmen."

Because they feel it is such a vital part of our economic and social life and because in aiding in education, private colleges which admit Negro leaders of the community it represents a safe, unconflicted way to reach the regulations of many government agencies have lent their names and time to the Fund. Among them are: John D. Rockefeller, Jr., chairman of the Fund; John F. Starnes, vice president, Standard Oil Company (New Jersey); chairman, 1949 national campaign, Winthrop W. Andrus, president, Chase National Bank, Fund treasurer; Samuel B. Jernigan, of the firm of accountants which bears the name chairman, Fund Foundations Committee; Thomas D.A. Brody, chairman of the board, Kappa and Eta 2, chairman of the Fund's public information committee; and Don G. Johnson, president, Spingarn Center, New York, chairman of the Fund.
