ATLANTA, Ga. — A Language Arts Workshop to be held at the Atlanta University Summer School, June 19-22, will be under the direction of Dr. Nathaniel P. Tilman, chairman of the Department of English, according to an announcement. For a period of six weeks, teachers who enroll will have opportunity to study intensively specific language problems that have arisen in their own schools. The primary purpose of the Workshop is to make available to teachers the resources of the University in improving the teaching of English and reading in the public schools. The workshop will concentrate upon the problems of the upper elementary grades and the high school.
