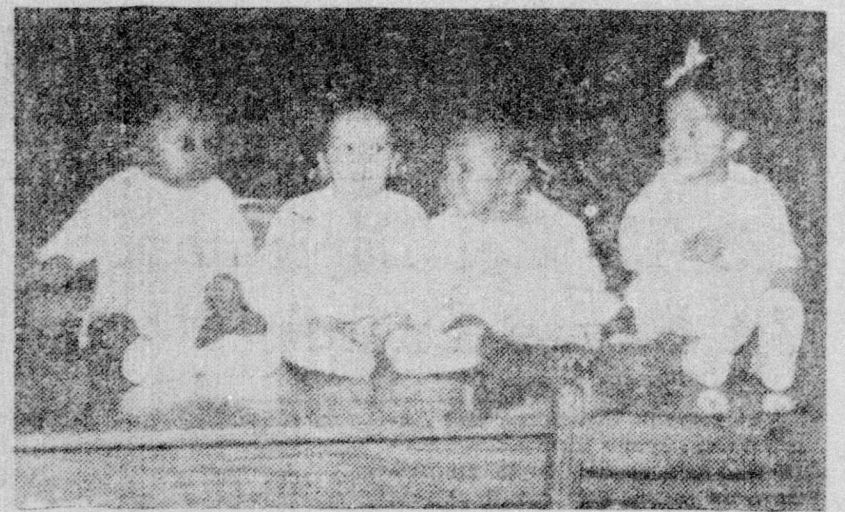

### REDDING TO TEACH AT BROWN UNIV.

HAMPTON, Va. — J. Sanders Redding, author and Professor of English at Hampton Institute, has accepted an invitation to become Visiting Professor of English at Brown University. It was learned here this week. He has been granted leave from Hampton for the Fall Semester.

Phi Beta Kappa from Brown, where he did both his undergraduate and graduate work and was for a year a University Scholar, will teach courses in literature and advanced writing. This fall will mark the beginning of his 7th year as a member of the Hampton faculty, including three years as full professor and two as Secretary of the Faculty. He is also president of the Hampton Chapter of the American Association of University Professors.

Before coming to Hampton, Professor Redding taught at Morehouse College, Louisville Municipal College, Southern University and the State Teachers College, Elizabeth City, N. C. He has published 2 books, "To Make a Poet Black," and "No Day of Triumph," the latter of which won the Mayflower Award in 44. Among other winners of the award, given annually by the Mayflower Society of North Carolina for the best book written by a resident of the State, have been Archibald Henderson for "Bernard Shaw," Playwright and Prophet, and Thomas Wolfe for "Look Homeward, Angel."

A contributor to Harper's, the American Mercury, the American Scholar and the Atlantic Monthly, Mr. Redding will teach courses in Government Fellowship in 1945-48, is now completing a book in the J. P. Lyonic, Jr. Provinces of America Series. A national magazine recently cited him, with Richard Wright, W. E. B. DuBois, Willard Motley and Ann Petry, as one of the "top ten" Negro writers.

Redding is the second member of the Hampton faculty to be granted a teaching leave in recent months. Hugh M. Gloster, Chairman of the Communications Center, will teach at New York University this summer.

### CONGRESSWOMAN IS SPEAKER FOR MEHARRY FINALS

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (ANP) — A class of 87 was graduated Monday afternoon from Meharry Medical College in impressive outdoor ceremonies. Cong. Frances Payne Bolton (R., O.) delivered a stirring commencement address.

Hundreds of alumni, friends and guests of the college visited the campus during graduation week. Highlights of the week were:

Rep. Bolton was elected as the first woman member of the college board of trustees since it was founded in 1876. Dr. William H. Allen became the new dean of the school of dentistry. The alumni association announced that it has raised \$200,000 toward the construction of a new \$500,000 dormitory.

In her address Rep. Bolton told the graduates that America's ultimate goal should be that of maximum personal freedom for every individual.

She said they had chosen a field of great services and of equally great responsibility in leadership. "Your influence will be more far reaching than you know, and what you live will be as truly productive as what you do," she declared. The congresswoman pointed out that the leadership the graduates had picked did not offer ease, but a hard and lonely road. "However," she said, "Serving America's dream is the most soul-satisfying task and the most momentous in the world."

Dr. M. Don Clawson, president of the college, presented the honor awards. Heads of the various schools awarded the certificates and degrees. Musical selections were provided by the Meharry singers, the Tennessee A and I singers, and organist Arthur R. Croley.

Dr. Walter S. Davis, president of Tennessee A and I, gave the invocation and Dr. Charles S. Johnson, president of Fisk University, pronounced benediction.

Presiding over the exercises was Thomas Graham Hall, chairman of the board of trustees.

### CAL. ASK TO DECLARE RALPH BUNCHE DAY

LOS ANGELES — The City of Los Angeles has been asked by the local NAACP branch to declare Sunday, July 17, "Ralph J. Bunche Day" in honor of the famed United Nations Mediator who on that day will receive the Spangum Medal, awarded annually by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People to a Negro American for a distinguished achievement.

## Bricks Is Scene Of PTA Summer Camp

RALEIGH — Approximately 75 children between the ages of 7 and 12 will enjoy camp life at the twelfth annual PTA Summer Camp at Bricks Rural Life School, Bricks, N. C., during the month of July.

The camp is under the exclusive direction of the North Carolina Congress of Colored Parents and Teachers.

The camp is divided into two periods: of two weeks each. Girls July 1-15 and Boys 17-30. Miss Maude Freeman who has been with the camp for several seasons as personnel director, will serve as the 1949 camp director. Mrs. L. B. Yancey of Henderson, originator of the camp idea, and State Chairman of Camp Committee will have direct supervision over the project.

Other staff members include: Miss Queen Davis Henderson, personnel director; Miss E. C. Martin, director of music and games; Mrs. Eula Davis Turner, dietitian; Mrs. Clara Parker, Rocky Mount, visiting nurse; Dr. J. O. Bryant, Enfield, visiting physician; Miss S. Kyler and Neil McLean of the Bricks Rural Life School will serve as coordinators.

Special parents' days have been arranged so that parents may inspect the new Fellowship House which was dedicated in May at the Bricks center. The Fellowship

House provides improved facilities for meals and camp activities. The first parents day will be July 10, during the girls' encampment; the second day during the boys' period, July 24.

For the past two summers the PTA Congress sponsored a western camp at Kings Mountain.

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
