## ART COLLECTION IS BEQUEATHED FISK UNIVERSITY

One of the finest modern art collections in America including representative works of Paul Cezanne, Pablo Picasso, Diego Rivera, and Georgia O'Keeffe and has been given in Fisk University.

Formerly the property of the late Alfred Stieglitz of New York, celebrated American champion of 20th century art, the collection went to Fisk by the decision of the executrix of the will, Stieglitz' widow, Georgia O'Keeffe.

It was her feeling that some of the fine examples of art should be the possession of institutions that would have great difficulty in acquiring such treasures under ordinary circumstances and also that they should be available to persons who ordinarily could not have access to the fine galleries of New York.

Five other institutions, including the Chicago Art League, will also receive portions of the total collection.

Dr. Charles S. Johnson, Fisk president, said that the bequest represented a "tremendous cultural contribution to Fisk, to Nashville, and to the South." Including more than 80 works of modern art, the collection will form the nucleus of a gallery planned at Fisk.

Alfred Starr, Nashville artist and art critic, termed the Stieglitz gift a "wonderful thing for both Fisk and Nashville", and said that the choice of Fisk as a depository for the Stieglitz collection has assured the school of further significant gifts from leading art collectors in this country.

## CAPTAIN PEARSON EXPLAINS CAREER GUIDANCE PLAN

During the recent years of War, so able-bodied young man tough in terms of an immediate job other than that of entrance into the Armed Forces. Under Selective Service, he had no choice. Now, however, these men do have a choice, according to Captain Joseph M. Pearson, recruiting officer at the Raleigh Army and Air Force recruiting station.

In its reorganization and planning, the Army is rapidly accomplishing a radically new personnel-management system known as the Career Guidance Plan.

The career guidance plan is based on two main concepts: One, that the soldier is an individual and that his ability and productivity are to be recognized through advancement in responsibility, rank, and pay. Two, that service in the Army is, in the strictest sense, a career experience, placing this individual on a professional level.

The career opportunities offered American youth today by the Army include advanced technical and administrative schooling; progression up the ladder on the basis of experience, efficiency, and knowledge; greater financial security; the privilege of overseas duty with its broadening experience and increased maturity; and an unequalled physical development program.

The Army career then, assumes its position as one of the desirable choices which this year's graduate may make.

With a higher degree of selectivity in the Army, fewer men will be allowed to enlist. Those who are accepted are in actuality, privileged. By entrance into the Army now, they are participating
