## 121 DESCENDANTS LEFT BY MRS. BUCK

## SEEK 2ND APPEAL IN HOUSING CASE

TRENTON, June 30 —Attorneys for the NAACP announced today that they are considering the best manner in which to get a speedy rehearing on the constitutional issues involved in the case of Seawell vs. McWhitney, after the New Jersey Supreme Court's technical reversal of a lower court decision ordering the East Orange City Council to admit Negroes to public housing projects on a non-segregated basis.

The court did not reverse on its merits the lower court decision declaring segregation in public housing to be discrimination, but ordered the case retried to determine whether the facts as they presently exist constitute segregation and whether limitation of Negroes to occupancy in certain segregated units of city housing projects was officially authorized by

the City of East Orange.

The NAACP pointed out, in commenting on the decision, that the only fact which has changed since the original decision was made is that a housing project proposed for Negro occupancy, not completed at the time of the first hearing, has now been completed and many apartments are not occupied.

## WOMAN ACQUITTED IN SHOTGUN DEATH

Miss Ada Louise Spruill, 23, was freed Monday following a coroner's jury verdict of "justified self-defense" in the shotgun slaying of her former sweetheart, 25 year old Willie Shields, a truck driver employed by the Jackson Transfer Co., of Ayden.

According to Miss Spruill's testimony at the inquest, the dead man had previously threatened her life on several occasions and had molested her several times on the day of the killing.

On the day of his death, according to Miss Spruill and other witnesses, Shields had threatened her early in the morning and then had returned to her house after dinner and had chased her out behind a barn and thrown glass jars and bottles at her.

Later he returned to the house with a knife, and told her that he was going to kill her or that she was going to kill him. The woman sought refuge in her house and seized a shotgun. As Shields came up on the porch with the knife in his hand she warned him away and then fired a blast which entered his chest and killed him instantly.

Following the shooting Miss Spruill was placed under arrest by Sheriff Ruel W. Tyson, and Deputy Jasper L. Mills. She was later released on \$1,000 bail.

At the inquest held by Pitt County Coroner Griffin H. Rouse; the jury was out only 3 short walls before returning its verdict.

Following Mrs. Spruill's exoneration she was freed and her bond released.

In his suit Woods claims that his aged wife had ordered the bank to destroy the codicil in her will which deprived him of his wife's estate estimated at \$26,000. When she married him January 14 she said it was to make sure that he got her estate when she died.

Before their marriage he had worked seven years for her as chauffeur.
