LAST RITES HELD SUMMER TERM FOR MRS. HAMER BEGINS AT TSU

Funeral services for Mrs. Lillian Hamer were held at the St. Mary's Baptist Church, Evergreen, N. C., on Thursday of the previous week.

The services were conducted by the Rev. W. L. Reid of Chatham. The Rev. Mitchell, who was pastor of this church for 27 years, spoke on the life of Sister Hamer.

Mrs. Hamer was 38 years old at the time for her death. She leaves to mourn a husband, two daughters, eight sons, a mother, a father, three sisters, four brothers and a host of relatives and friends.

A special workshop program, Resource-Use Education, defined by Dr. Edward Weaver as "the means by which we train people to use and develop the natural resources through the application of the best known technical skills and information to fulfill their needs, those of their neighbors, their community, their nation and their world," has become a valuable asset to each department of the University.

In the Music Department an experimental Music Clinic composed of approximately 34 students, has been inaugurated. It has become a laboratory for classes in conducting and classes in senior high school methods.

Due to the increased summer enrollment, there are ten additional members of the faculty at TSU. They are C. A. Linder and J. Vinson in the English Department; Wallace Van Jackson, chief librarian; Dr. John E. Codwell, Dr. Ira B. Bryant, Emile Fensworth, Dr. Clara E. Henderson and Pauline Campbell in Education; Mrs. Gladys Childress Terry in the Music Department; and Miss Jenelise Walden in the Arts Department.

Special plans are being developed for the second six weeks term. The administration expects to have a specialist in the training of handicapped children and also classes in the handling of children of kindergarten age.

College, Negro 4-H Club leader for the State. The regional camp will be held at the Agricultural and Industrial College, Nashville, Tenn.

Six of the delegates were named to attend the first annual camp in 1948 but were unable to do so because of a polio epidemic in the State. The six — Rufus Kelly of Anson County, Henry Lee Swimpson of Martin, Norman Stroud of Harnett, Cora Gwendolyn Harris of Franklin, Otha Geraldine Jones of Martin, and Susie Moore of Bladen — will attend camp this year.

The eight delegates chosen for 1949 are Raymond Boddie of Edgecombe, Eddie Watford of Bertie, Claude Dunston of Bladen, Raphael Cutbertson of Mecklenburg, Mildred Ross of Rowan, Ruby Massey of Harnett, Marge Ree Gay of Pitt, and Pearl G. Carr of Martin.

Cooper and Mrs. Ruby C. Carraway, northeastern district Negro home demonstration agent, will accompany the delegates to Nashville.

"Better Living for a Better World" will be the theme for the camp. Speakers will include Dr. H. L. Trier, president of St. Augustine College, Raleigh.
