Leola Ruffin is home visiting his sisters, Mrs. Charlie Collins and Mrs. Eva Miller. He makes his home in Baltimore, Md.

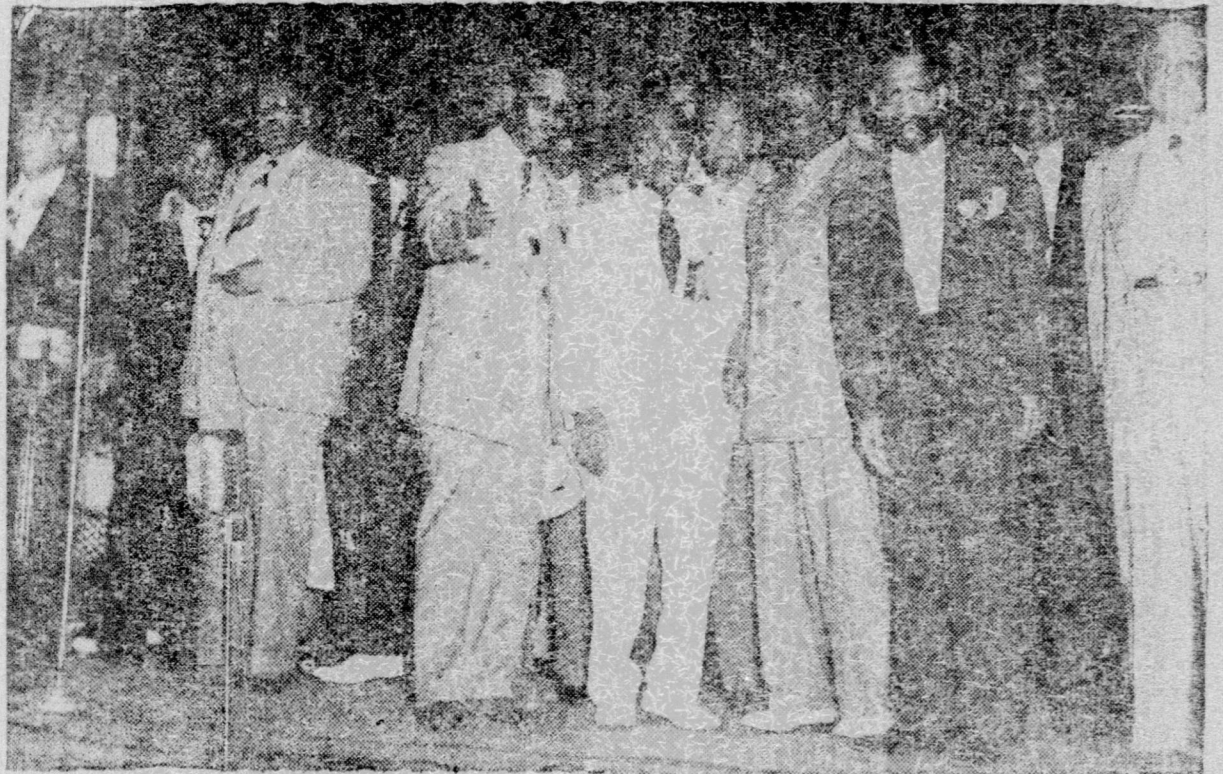

WARNING ISSUED ON FOREST FIRES

NEW YORK — It's too late to warn the nation in most vacation areas.

It really ought to be the "forest fire prevention" season instead, according to the National Board of Fire Underwriters. Campers, motorists and residents of forest areas should use increasing care and caution this year to prevent needless destruction of U. S. wooded resources and watersheds.

Here's how you can help save the forests:

1. Watch your smoking. Don't smoke in dry, hazardous areas. Extinguish all fires before discarding them. Stamp out every cigarette butt.

2. Be care in building, feeding and extinguishing campfires. Put your campfire out with water or damp earth before leaving it.

3. Consult your nearest Soil Conservation office before burning brush or grass. Remember, burning does more harm than good to your soil.

4. Make and remember the Conservation Pledge, which says: "I give my pledge as an American to save and faithfully to defend from waste the natural resources of my country — its soil and minerals, its forests, waters and wildlife."

JURORS ASK NEW TRIAL FOR KILLER

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. (AP) — Ten of the twelve jurors who convicted Bayard Rustin, a Negro leader, for murder of Mrs. Kathryn Miller last November 23, have asked the court for a new trial.

This almost unprecedented break in the campaign to free the 19-year-old victim of what has been labeled a police "bump-up" was revealed when personal letters from each of the ten jurors, including the foreman, were presented to Judge Frank Smith, the presiding judge, who is now considering Rustin's plea for a new trial.

All the jurors cited their misgivings over new evidence uncovered after they had convicted the youth of murder last June 8, on the sole evidence of a repudiated "confession" which Jenkins alleged police forced from him.

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
