Combine 1/2 cup margarine, 1 jar bleu cheese spread, 1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, and 1/4 teaspoon onion juice. Blend thoroughly. Mix together 1 pound finely ground beef, 1 tablespoon margarine, 3/4 cup soft bread crumbs, 1/4 cup milk, 1 egg, well beaten, 1 teaspoon salt, and 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Shape into 6 patties. Cut in 2 tablespoons margarine. Sauté in half and toast hamburger rolls. Spread each generously with cheese mixture. Place cooked patties between halved rolls. Serve on plates garnished with pickle relish and ripe tomato slices. Makes 6.

# THREE HELD IN MURDER INVESTIGATION

GREENSBORO — James Wallace and Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Tucker of 139 Clinton Street and Flex Maynard of the same address are being held for investigation in connection with the fatal stabbing of Wilber L. Chatham, who was found dead Monday morning near the railroad tracks on East Street.

Detective Captain W. T. Jennings said that an ice-pick, or similar shaped instrument was the murder weapon. Chatham was killed by a weapon which went thru his shoulder, from the back, and pierced his heart. His body was found at 5 a.m. Monday and the county coroner estimated that he had been dead for three hours. Signs of an intense struggle were found near the place where the body was discovered.

This was the fifth murder to be committed locally since January. The previous ones have all been cleared by arrests.

# Probe Underway In Georgia Lynchings

An on-the-spot undercover investigation of recent Ga. lynchings and the relationship of the Ku Klux Klan to the State Administration has been launched by the Bill of Rights Conference, it was announced today by Executive Director, Clark Foreman.

Mr. Foreman, the former President of the Southern Conference for Human Welfare, declined to disclose the personnel of the investigating staff on the grounds that it would hamper their movements and expose them to physical violence, "every lynching."

"This much I can say about the director of the inquiry," Mr. Foreman said. "He is a distinguished resident of the State of Georgia known for his scholarship and courage."

The inquiry will concentrate on three phases of the Georgia pattern of terror," Mr. Foreman continued. It will look into Dr. Samuel Green's boast that he has been on the personal staff of Governor Herman Talmadge since last November. Green is the Klan's Grand Dragon.

The investigators, all natives or residents of the state, will also gather data behind the recent arrests and beatings of persons known to advocate equal rights for the Negro people. One of those jailed in recent weeks is Homer Chase, Communist Party leader in Georgia.

"The issue in this case," Mr. Foreman said, "is the right of p-

tical opposition which involves progressive elements in the Democratic Party as well as the Republican and Progressive parties. Included in the scope of the investigation," Mr. Foreman said, "is the night-ride violence against Negroes who participate in any degree in the political life of their community and state."

The lynching of Caleb Hill, Jr., on Memorial Day last will be the third area of investigation with the main line of inquiry directed toward documenting the efforts or lack of efforts by local and state authorities to apprehend the lynchers.

A full report of the committee's findings will be among the documents to be submitted to the Bill of Rights Conference on July 19-17 at the Henry Hudson Hotel, New York City. Sponsors of the national conference with offices at Suite 322, 11 West 42nd Street, New York City, include more than 500 educators, scientists, labor leaders, artists and ministers.

## ANTI-SEMITISM RAMPANT IN WISCONSIN REPORTS

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (Global) — Bruno V. Biker, a member of the Mayor's Committee on Human Relations, is charging that anti-Semitism was rife in some Wisconsin reports. "The use of phrases, 'Gentile Only,' 'restricted clientele' or similar un-American restrictions has become so widespread in certain parts of the State as to become a matter of shame to decent, thoughtful citizens."
