TRUMAN GREET'S NEW YORKER ON 101ST BIRTHDAY

NEW YORK (ANP)—President Harry S. Truman and New York's Mayor William O'Dwyer were among the numerous persons sending greetings to Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Overbaugh in her 101st birthday, June 28.

Probably the oldest living native of the world's largest city, Mrs. Overbaugh reared her children, Bosworth Overbaugh, 67, and his wife, Mrs. Serwell Overbaugh. Her son is superintendent of the building in which they live at 474 W. 150th St.

He is the only living child of 14 children of Mrs. Overbaugh. According to Bosworth she was married at 17, and her husband for a long time was the only Negro barber on Grand St. in downtown New York.

In recalling many happy days of her life, Mrs. Overbaugh still remembers that in her childhood she played with Indian children. She was born on Elizabeth St. in what is now downtown New York. Mrs. Overbaugh heard her children all alike. In fact she made her boys wear braids just like her girls. She deprecates the "looseness" of the younger generation of today.

"Children aren't brought up the way they used to be," she said. "They don't pay any mind to their parents anymore. There aren't enough restrictions. What makes it a shame is that this generation is supposed to be more intelligent than mine."

During her lifetime, Mrs. Overbaugh has never drunk nor smoked. She eats regularly every day. Many of her friends visited her at her birthday party. She still has most of her teeth, and is in the best of health. Among her many birthday greetings was one from President Truman which said in part:

"It is a privilege to join with your friends in felicitating you and in extending good wishes for your health and happiness."
"Signed: Harry S. Truman, The President of the United States."

ARRESTED FOR HIT AND FLY KILLING

ROANOKE, Va. (ANP)—A white GI, Cpl. Robert E. Pennick, 22, was arrested here last week for the "hit and fly" slaying of a Negro, John J. Hall, 55-year-old farmer while he was driving his mule on the highway.

Four other people riding with Hall on his muledrawn wagon were uninjured when Pennick, trying to land a rented airplane on the road, clipped Hall with the plane's wing and kept going. He landed at Alexander City, 25 miles away and reported the incident.

He told police that he attempted to land because he thought the airship was running out of gas.

POST OFFICE CLERK ADMITS 200 MAIL THEFTS

ST. LOUIS (ANP)—Hugh Hoy-Hos Liston, 21-year-old clerk in the Main Post Office, was reported to have signed a statement here last week confessing he had stolen 200 pieces of mail in two and a half months from which he had taken an estimated \$400-\$500. Liston was arrested by city detectives and postal inspectors. A federal warrant issued charged him with embezzling 27 first class letters.

When arrested, Liston turned over 11 of the letters and their contents to his attorney's partner, Henry and produced 36 more from which he had obtained his FTAO which he had obtained \$52.63 in cash the night before. He later turned over four more letters found in his locker at the post office.

He has been employed in the letter mail distribution section, and has no previous police record.

SIX FIRED IN POST OFFICE LOYALTY PROBE

PHILADELPHIA (ANP)—Two more post office clerks here have been suspended from their jobs by the government on the grounds that they were "disloyal to the United States." This brings the number up to six.

On June 28, John C. Lyman, 46, and Reese J. Brown, 32, were suspended. Lyman had over 28 years in the service and Brown had 12. It was a matter of months before Lyman would have been retired after entering the postal service in 1920.

On June 29, Edward Allen Smith, a 24-year-old Navy veteran, and a clerk of four years was suspended because of alleged Communist connections. He was charged with attending a social affair given by the party 10 years ago while a student in high school. The first of the local six to go was William Ridgeway, 47, who was suspended in March. Next was Felix Titus, 55, and Clarence Haughton, 53. Both men have over 28 years of service.

He said he and three other soldiers had rented the plane over the holiday weekend in Columbia, S. C., to fly home to Mississippi and Louisiana. The other three GIs supported his story. Sheriff Jim Abney said: "Hall died in a hospital two hours after the plane struck him," the sheriff said.
