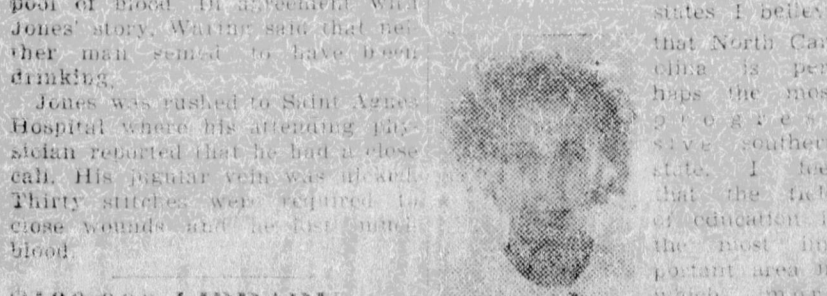

Also included in the plan was the plan that specifications have already been drawn for a new Negro high school, and that contracts will probably be let for its construction sometime this month.

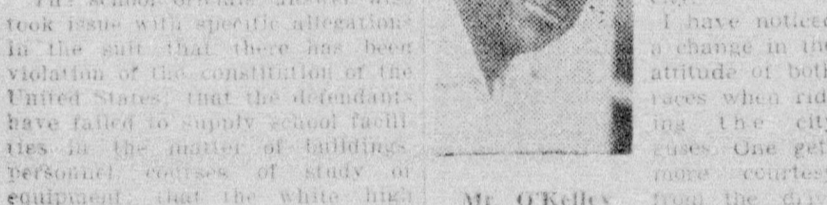
The plans for construction of the new high school, they said, were drawn before the suit was filed, or as far as the defendants knew, even thought of.

In answer to claims that space is lacking for the conduct of an adequate vocational-instruction program in the Negro school the school officials stated that space is lacking in both the Negro and white schools, but that this condition will be remedied with the construction of the new school.

FAMILY ARGUMENT

According to a police investigation McLain had been quarreling with his wife, Mrs. Ozelia McDowell McLain, because she stopped on the street to speak to a girl she knew. The younger daughter tried to intervene and was charged that she was knocked down and kicked by McLain. In a signed statement Mrs. McDowell says that her stepfather was beating her mother and that she went to the home of her older sister for help.

The two girls returned in a taxi and the cab driver is quoted as saying that he heard the older sister say that she was going to kill her stepfather. Several other witnesses said that she advanced on McLain, saying that she was going to kill him. She fired three shots from the pistol which she had brought with her from home and one bullet lodged in the man's heart. He was pronounced dead on arrival at the hospital a few minutes later.

The daughter then tried to go home of an uncle in Dunn where she was arrested at about 5 o'clock Tuesday morning. Her sister was arrested Monday night in Fayetteville.

The girl's mother said that her husband was to have entered the veterans hospital on Tuesday for treatment. They had been married about five months.

There are a number of conflicting stories about the events leading up to the killing. None of the witnesses made any statement about McLain attempting to harm Mrs. McLain. Several testified in signed statements that the girl told her stepfather she was going to kill him for whipping her mother.

GRAY FORCED

Dr. Gray's difficulties began several months ago when he appeared before the State Committee on Un-American Activities and opposed the inclusion of a loyalty oath for teachers of a pledge to uphold the segregated patterns of the south.

Immediately following this appearance two state investigators were assigned to "investigate" his administration. A report which was submitted by these investigators contained the following charges:

- That he had made public statements opposing the way that Negroes were treated in Florida.
- He opposed the idea of regional education.
- He had changed the curriculum of the college from the "practical to the abstract."
- From the industrial to college level.
- He had permitted members of his faculty to belong to and to help raise funds for the NAACP.
- He had done nothing to halt Negro students from applying and filing suits to enter the white University of Florida.

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BARKLEY HEARD BY MIXED GROUP

SPARTANBURG, S. C. — A few hours after a tempest in a capitol had been stirred up in Columbia over the question of whether Negroes would be permitted to attend the party, an address at which Vice President Barkley was scheduled to be the principal speaker, the Vice President spoke to a mixed audience in Spartanburg.

Addressing the convention of the American Federation of Labor held at the Cleveland Hotel, Mr. Barkley spoke to an audience in which there were no less than eight Negro delegates, who sat where they pleased. The delegates shook hands with the Vice President following his speech.

SEVERAL FILE FOR CITY JOBS IN RICHMOND

RICHMOND, Va. (AP) — A number of the 40 persons who have made application to take the city's open examination for stenographers and clerks, there are several Negroes, it was learned here last week. The jobs range in pay from \$135 to \$220 a month.

The exact number of Negroes among the applicants could not be determined because city employment applications no longer require indication of race.

One Negro stenographer has been employed under the new personnel setup, and another was expected to replace one in the juvenile and Domestic Relations court.

PENN. GOV. BLOWS TOP

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — In a recent press conference when questioned on the FEPC bill Governor James H. Duff said, "I tried to get the bill through last session. If any seek to dispute my word, I say to hell with them."

He stated the naming of a Goodwill commission to study the problem of fair employment in the state is still a possibility and such a body was suggested after the 1949 legislature had met. He related that the naming of a commission of this kind would not be a substitute for the law but it would afford full chances for the situation to be studied by a disinterested group.

Pennsylvania's legislature killed a proposed state FEPC bill when it came up although the governor succeeded to be held in August is said to have backed it.
