## SPECIFIC ANSWERS

The school officials answer also took issue with specific allegations in the suit that there has been violation of the constitution of the United States; that the defendants have failed to supply school facilities in the matter of buildings, personnel, courses of study, equipment; that the white high school has twice the personnel and facilities of the colored school; or that there were a thousand more students at the Negro school.

trial and tribulation.

You record of achievement through four decades in stimulating changes in the field of human relations suggests that your Association will redouble its efforts in support of the goals all true Americans seek. In so doing you will be aiding our nation in its difficult task of world leadership toward peace, equality and security for every human being.

The daughter then fled to the home of an uncle in Dunn where she was arrested at about 5 o'clock Tuesday morning. Her sister was arrested Monday night in Fayetteville.

The girl's mother said that her husband was to have entered the veterans hospital on Tuesday for treatment. They had been married about five months.

area where our people have been confronted with challenges requiring their best efforts. We are in such a period today. The full force of postwar problems lie over us and we are in a bind. Our democratic way is a reflection of the stresses and strains abroad. Our greatest hope for success in meeting these situations lies in the strength and unity of our people behind the ideals which go to make our nation.

One of these ideals is the elimination of discrimination based upon race, religion or national origin so that all Americans may enjoy equality of opportunity to achieve the best under our system, only in this way can democracy survive. My views on this question are well known. I have endorsed the objective and I have reiterated that the Federal Government must lead the way in the attack upon these evils. Some action has been taken toward implementation of a national military establishment and a beginning has been made in the area of employment in the Federal Government itself. I have submitted legislative proposals to Congress looking toward establishment in law of the recommendations of the President's Committee on Civil Rights.
