DETROIT (AP)—There will be six organizations concerned with various phases of business activity meeting here next week.

First there is the National Negro Business League which will be holding its 5th annual meeting. The others are the National Real Estate Lawyers Association, the National Builders Association, the National Building and Loan Association, the National Business Education League and the Housewives' League. The latter is a direct auxiliary of the Business League while the other four are closely identified.

President Horace Sudduth of the National Negro Business League welcomes the advent of the other groups. He is preparing a bold new plan which will permit each of the other affiliated bodies to name a representative to sit on the board of the national league.
