

EARTHQUAKE AREA RECEIVES \$50,000 FROM U.S. RED CROSS

Basil O'Cennor, president of the American Red Cross this week alocated \$50,000 for emergency medsupplies and other necessitie. for victors of the Equadorian earthquake, and dispatched ARC repreentatives to Equador to assist m relief operations
