Prof. E. O. Lawrence

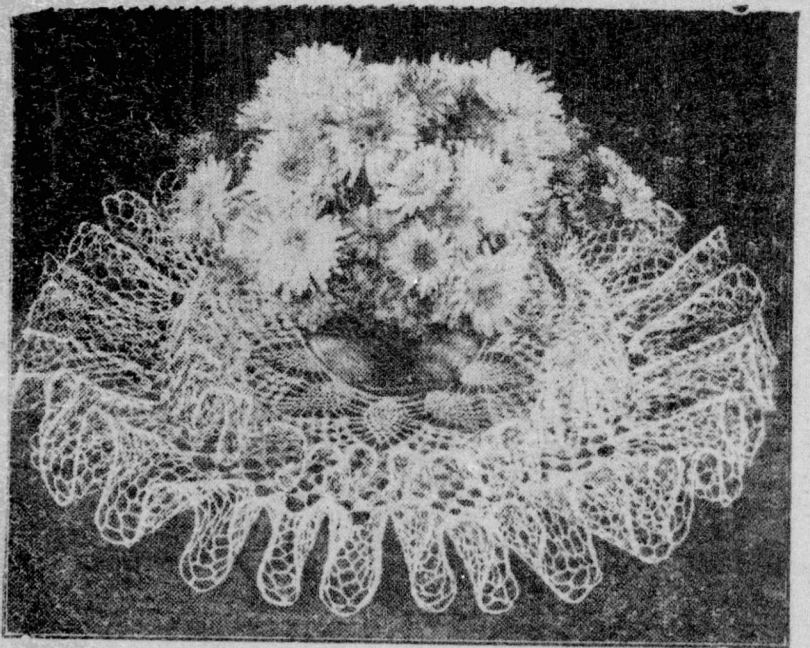

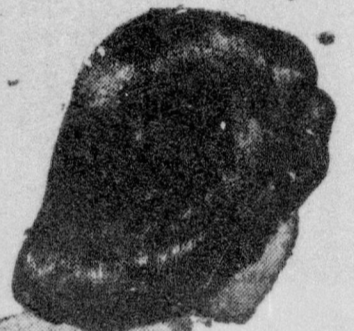
