### KENTUCKY 4-H'ERS SELL OVER \$4,000 WORTH OF CATTLE

Kentucky colored 4-H boys and girls sold \$4365 worth of calves and pigs last week at their second annual livestock show held in Russellville, Ky., reports Bennett K. Brown, Agricultural Extension Agent of Logan and Sampson counties and director of the show.

Owner of the grand champion calf, an Aberdeen Black Angus, was Ray J. Young of the Round Pond Community. His calf weighed 1,015 pounds and brought \$300, including the prize money. Second award went to a Hereford calf owned by Doris Gaines of the Olmstead community. Her calf brought \$265.

The champion pig was owned by Virgil Lee Dickerson of Adairville Community. This pig weighed 320

pounds and brought \$90. The second place pig belonged to Gred D. Sweatt and brought \$60. Altogether, 17 calves and 22 pigs were sold for a total of \$4,365.68.

Principal speaker at the livestock show was A. A. Fuhr, administrative officer from the Washington office of the Farm Credit Administration. He discussed the importance of cooperation between parents and 4-Hers in carrying out successful projects.

Livestock judges were Grady Sellers, swine specialist of the University of Kentucky, and John Grady, Agricultural Extension agent of Hopkins County.
