

## UNIVERSAL BLDG. HOLDS COMFORTS FOR EMPLOYEES

MEMPHIS (ANP) — Memphis has been beastly hot at times this summer but there is one group of Memphians, the Universalists, who have taken the temperature in their stride and revolved in coolness.

One of the few large structures in the entire South owned by Negroes which is completely air-conditioned, the new half million dollar Universal Life Insurance company building here, has proven a boon to its employees. Many of them do not go immediately home after work is finished for the day but instead spend time in the commodious recreation room in the base-

ment to which a large cafeteria is attached. There they escape the humidity outside and hold committee meetings, play bridge or just relax over in the section where there are musical instruments, juke boxes and a radio.

A Marco Walker, vice-president and attorney of Universal, commented this week that the new facility has been a surprising factor in stimulating good company-employee relations.

## Hampton Grads Told Of Role of Teacher

HAMPTON, Va. — Society expects several definite things of the teacher, the most important of which is that he be "a force for leadership" in the community. President Alonzo G. Moran declared in his summer convocation address before the Hampton Institute graduates Friday, August 19.

President Moran, who holds a Ph. D. degree from the University of Pittsburgh, an M. L. B. from Harvard Law School, outlined four separate qualifications society expects of the teacher.

"First and most obvious — adequate preparation. . . second, that the teacher widen the horizons of the students and develop the urge for additional knowledge. . . third, that he be able to get along with students, teachers, and employers and be able to follow as well as lead. . . but most important that he be a force for social and civic leadership in the community."

"PECULIAR PROBLEMS" — Dealing especially with the peculiar problems of Negro teachers in segregated society, Mr. Moran emphasized the double need that

Negro communities have for leadership from their teachers. He complimented teachers for "taking the first step to make so-called 'separate and equal' education 'really equal' by instituting suits for salary equalization. He added, "It is not to our credit that salary equalization suits and suits for admission to graduate schools come before suits about the quality of educational resources for our young boys and girls."

Mr. Moran asserted that poor schools for Negroes, the result of a segregated system, "have retarded the development of generations of boys and girls whom we need to furnish intelligent leadership for our communities."

## S. AFRICA OPPOSES NEGRO TROOP USE
