Community Chest Announces Budget

By WADE LUCAS Public Relations Director, Wake County Community Chest. Negroes of Raleigh and Wake County will as they have in the past, share in funds to be raised in late October and early November for Community Chest needs in the city and county during the coming year.

The budget for 1950 for carrying on the work of the Chest in the city and county is \$145,467, or about \$1,000 less than what it was this year.

Among the Community Chest agencies are: the Bloodworth St. YWCA, which is slated to get \$7,968 of the funds raised in the coming campaign; Tattler Community Center, which gets \$7,865; Negro Girl Scouts of the city and county will share \$10,795 with the white Girl Scouts; and the Negro YWCA will share \$22,250 with the white YWCA.

Other sums budgeted for other participating agencies all of which render service to Negroes as well as whites are: Family Service Society, which aids with home problems; \$20,000; Child Guidance Clinic, which aids in giving advice on rearing children, \$11,700; the Salvation Army, who work among Negroes as well as whites is well known to almost everybody, \$11,500; Social Hygiene Society, which is doing research into venereal diseases, \$293; and \$6,500 to the United Service Organizations (USO) to help reactivate clubs in this country and overseas for the benefit of

George V. Denny, Jr., president of Town Hall, will be moderator; K. Sawar Hasan, executive secretary of the Pakistan Institute of International Affairs, will act as interpreter; and David Newsum, information officer at the American Embassy in Karachi, will be coordinator.
