

# PROMISES TO RUN JIMCROW OUT OF N. Y.

New York (ANP) — In his first press-luncheon, since winning the nomination of the American Labor party as its choice for mayor of this city in the coming Fall election, Cong. Vito Marcantonio said last Wednesday that "when I am mayor, and I will be elected by a majority of 25,000 to 30,000 votes, I shall run jim crow from this city."

While on the subject of discrimination in the city, Marcantonio, often regarded as a Communist, said that Mayor William O'Dwyer, while telling the Negroes that he is for civil rights and against all forms of discrimination has upheld the segregation policy of the Metropolitan Insurance company in its Snyvesant project by sending his corporation counsel to Albany before the State Supreme court to uphold the "Caucasian" clause in the company's renting leases.

"In regards to Levittown," a veteran's project in Long Island which refuses to rent or lease to Negro vets, Marcantonio continued, "I will also fight that and if the House had allowed my amendment to the recent Housing bill, passed, become a reality, this Jim-crowism would not have been able to continue."

Blasting both the Consolidated Edison and Bell Telephone companies for their extravagant high rates to consumers, the Congressman said that "as mayor I will have a Municipal Power company and will charge the people TVA rates, thus saving the consumers at least \$37,000,000 per year which they over pay each year."

He also promises to reduce the 10-cent subway fare back to a nickel, and said that all municipal employees, including the police department and sanitation workers will only work 40 hours a week and the latter workers will be permitted to join a union.

"The entire ALP ticket will win this year," was his final prediction.

# PAIR JAILED ON REEFER CHARGE

Jon Elroy Sanford, known in the entertainment world as "Redd Foxx," and his wife, Evelyn, were arrested here last week by state narcotics officers and charged with the illegal possession and the selling of reefer cigarettes.

Foxx was in the middle of his act as master of ceremonies when the officers moved in and placed him under arrest. Both Sanford and his wife were jailed later because they could not meet the \$5,000 bail placed on them by Municipal Court Judge George E. Yost.

The couple was trapped when Federal agents, working with state agents, purchased reefers from Foxx.

The suspect is a native of Newark, N. J., and at the time of his arrest was staying at the Douglas hotel in Philadelphia.

Also taken in the raid were Mrs.

Mary Fowler, who operates the kitchen concession at the Jersey night spot, Mrs. Ruth Mosee, a pianist, and Rosetta Davis, a singer.

The raid was led by Joseph M. Bransky, district supervisor of the Federal Narcotics bureau after his men were said to have made purchases from Foxx three times before the night of the arrests. The price, according to the agent, was 30 cents each. On the night of the raid, one agent bought 19 reefers with marked money.

# STEPS LISTED IN BLOAT CONTROL

A new six-page folder on 'Bloat in Cattle and Sheep' has just been published by the State College Extension Service and copies are available on request.

The publication was prepared by Dr. C. D. Grinnells, professor of veterinary science for the Agricultural Experiment Station, who describes bloat as "a disease of major economic importance."

"More reports than usual of bloat and fatalities from it have been received this year," Dr. Grinnells says. "An increase in our cattle population and legume acreage will bring this condition to our attention especially when weather conditions are conducive to rapid growth of legumes."

Symptoms of bloat include prominent swelling in the left flank, uneasiness or nervousness, rapid ballooning of the left flank, swelling which rebounds and gives a dull sound when thumped, cessation of cud chewing, labored breathing, moaning and dilated nostrils.

Dr. Grinnells listed the following preventive measures: Feed dry roughage or graze grass pastures before placing animals on rich legume pasture; use cottonseed hulls and corn silage to prevent alfalfa bloat; mix grasses with legumes so they make up 50 per cent of the mixture; allow alfalfa to mature before grazing; closely supervise

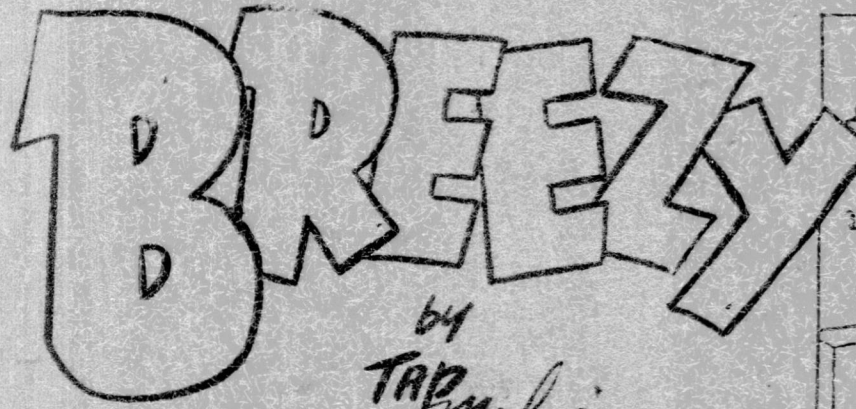
# ELECTED TO CALIF. HISTORICAL BODY

LOS ANGELES (ANP) — Titus Alexander, prominent resident of this city, was honored recently with membership in the California Historical Society for recognition of his long-time work in the field of Negro history. President Aubrey Drury informed Mr. Alexander of his election by the Society's Board of Directors at their last meeting.

Mr. Alexander came to California in 1897, and though he has been engaged in engineering as a vocation, he has had an avocation the gathering of material on the Negro in American history and more particularly in California history.
