DILLARD TAKES 2 DURHAM DIVIDES OPENING GAMES

DURHAM — A pass interception late in the first half paved the way for a Dillard High School touchdown drive last week which turned out to be the only score in the Goldsboro gridiron's opening game against the Hillside High School Hornets of Durham.

Butting before a rabidly partisan crowd, the Goldsboro and Durham teams struggled through a scoreless first quarter during which play was slowed considerably by fumbles and penalties.

In the second period, however, Tom Evans, Dillard halfback, intercepted a Hornet pass thrown by James Gouthing and carried the leather from his own 44 to the Durham 37.

An aerial offensive by the Goldsboro team proved more productive, and the Dillard gridiron moved the ball to the Hornet eleven and then scored four plays later on a line play by Evans after a 14 yard run by Coley.

The Hillside team moved back onto the winning side of the ledger last Friday night, however, by kicking out a 13-12 victory over Lincoln High of Chapel Hill at Chapel Hill.

The Dillard Tigers continued their winning ways by driving to a smashing 25-0 win over the Clinton High School 11 at Clinton.
