GREENSBORO — Fred W. Gesene, Executive Secretary of the North Carolina Bankers' Association, announced this week the first attempt to establish a serviceable public-speaking contest for colored students in this State.

He said Bond and cash awards exceeded \$6,000 in the 1948-49 white contest alone, so he expects a growth of prize values since contests for colored and white pupils this year.

The event will be held under the joint leadership of bankers, A. and T. College, and professional workers in education and soil conservation, and will be launched immediately.

According to J. H. Waecker, a member of the steering committee, and vice president of the Mechanics and Farmers Bank in Durham, all colored students in Edgecombe, Halifax, Nash, Northampton, Wilson, Chatham, Durham, Franklin, Granville, Harnett, Johnston, Person, Orange, Vance, Wake and Warren counties are eligible to enter the contest this year.

NEW YORK (AP) — Funeral services were held here last week for Thomas Yenser, 63-year-old editor and publisher of "Who's Who in Colored America." Yenser died at Kings County hospital.

His "Who's Who" has been published since 1927 and is used widely as a reference work. He traveled widely, interviewed Negroes eminent in religious, educational, professional and commercial fields in compiling materials for his work. Born in Lexington, Pa., he first worked as a printer's apprentice. Later he became a compositor for various New York newspapers and then joined the advertising department of the Long Island railroad.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Agnes Yenser, two sons and three daughters. Funeral services were conducted in the Walter B. Cook Funeral home.

LIONS READY FOR DELA. STATE

Lincoln University, Pa. — Confidence after two opening victories over St. Paul's, Poyteah and AL Bright College, the Lincoln University Lions buckled down to serious work this week in preparation for more serious combat on Saturday, when they will journey to Dover for their encounter with Delaware State.

Last year Delaware gave the Lincoln gridders quite a jolt by walking off with the ball game 7-6. Last week's scores appear to give the Lincoln Lions the edge, however, for while Delaware was taking a trouncing from a strong Morgan eleven 22-0, Lincoln had already tucked away a neat 14-12 victory over the Lions of Albright College, in a thrill-packed game that was decided only in the closing minutes, when Reg Pulley, Lincoln fullback, made his way up the field on a 76 yard run back for the winning touchdown.

The Lincoln line this year is especially weak, lacking both weight and experience. The passing attack and defense could stand considerable improvement as well. Despite these handicaps, however, the team is shaping up so well that already loyal alumni are beginning to mutter about a possible victory over Howard this year.
