State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

QUESTION: How can I reduce damage to wheat caused by the Hessian fly?

ANSWER: George D. Jones, extension entomologist at State College, says the best way to observe safe seeding dates for the wheat crop. Control of the Hessian fly in wheat is a problem every year, but the abundance of the pest seems to vary to some extent from year to year, he points out. The 1949 crop was not seriously affected by the fly, but the entomologist urges farmers to observe safe seeding dates for wheat in order to keep losses on next year's crop at a minimum. Information on safe seeding dates may be obtained from the Entomology Department, State College Station, Raleigh.

ANSWER: S. H. Dobson and R. L. Kuyven, State College agronomists, say: "As a general rule, seeding alfalfa to thicken the stand has not been successful. If a stand becomes thin, seed 35 or 40 pounds of alfalfa a case per acre after the last cutting. This will add a year or two to the life of the hay crop, will be better for hay cultivation in preventing the entrance of weeds and crabgrass, and will increase the yield of good hay. The alfalfa-rhoad grass mixture can be used for grazing."

SIX TO RECEIVE HILLMAN Washington, D. C. — Six Howard University students will receive benefits during the current school year from a \$2,000 grant to Howard University by the Sidney Hillman Foundation. It was announced today by Dr. Max Meeker, chairman of the committee on scholarships and student aid. Each of the six students will receive \$333.33 to aid him in his academic work at the University.

All six students qualified for the scholarship awards on the basis of having better than a "B" average in scholarship, in addition to their interests in labor relations. Beneficiaries of the Hillman Awards must be majoring in the social sciences, possessed of a high scholastic record and in need of scholarship assistance.

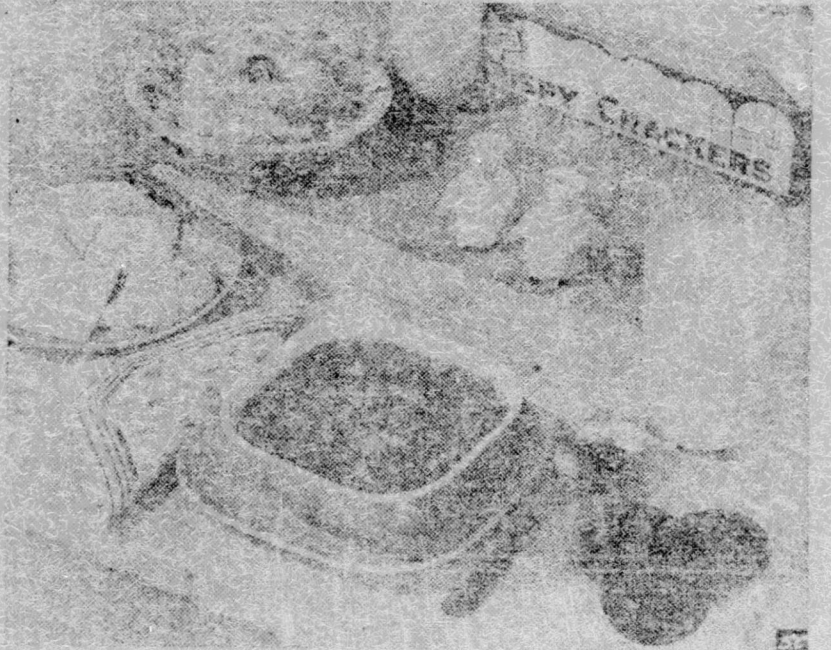

Varied Combinations Give New Interest to Popular Soup-and-Cracker Lunches



Steaming bowls of soup with crispy crackers and a fresh fruit salad hit the spot for lunches during the winter months. A lunch of this kind is as nutritious as it is warming on cold days.

Bring variety to meals which feature soup by serving a variety of crackers. Some days have crispy square white crackers; other days, accompany the soup with the round scalloped variety or dainty wheat toast wafers. Inch-square cheezettes serve as ready-made croutons to float on soup. They're especially good with cream soups.

The wide variety of prepared soup mixes and canned soups available helps the busy homemaker. They are good as they are and also lend themselves to many delightful combinations. Here are a few suggestions for achieving variety with canned soups.

Chicken-Vegetable Soup: Mix 1 can chicken soup with 1 can vegetable soup. Heat to boiling and serve.

Creamy Chicken-Tomato Soup: Mix 1 can chicken soup with 1 can tomato soup. Stir in 1 can of milk and heat.

Chicken-Mushroom Soup: Place 1 can cream of mushroom soup in saucepan and stir until smooth. Add 1 can chicken soup and 1 can water, stirring constantly. Heat to boiling and serve.
