About 40 percent of the 15,000,000 eligible World War II veterans have had some sort of GI training since the law went into effect in June 1944, a recent survey of Veterans Administration records disclosed.

When the Veterans Administration begins mailing out special National Service Life Insurance dividend checks to 16 million World War II veterans sometime in January, 1950, the schedule calls for issuing about 200,000 checks each working days so the payment can be completed by June.

#### DILLARD HIGH TIGERS CONTINUE WINNING STREAK

The first of the season of the Dillard High Tigers football team was a victory over Rocky Mount, N.C. on Saturday, October 29. The Tigers, coached by Coach G. E. Harris, won the game 14-0. The game was played at Rocky Mount, N.C. The Tigers scored a touchdown in the first quarter and another in the second quarter. The Tigers also scored a field goal in the second quarter. The Tigers' defense was excellent, preventing Rocky Mount from scoring. The game was a hard-fought one, but the Tigers came out on top.

In the second quarter Everett opened a rushing attack against the Lions. Passes to Ward and Coley soon put the ball near pay dirt. A pass to Evans from 14 to the 12 was a setup for another touchdown which was filled by the halftime. The second half opened with Everett passing and fighting against the double reverse and passing plays of the Lions. Early in the third quarter Evans, from his 45, ran 22 yards. A pass from Everett to Coley led the Tigers to Coley's off tackle touchdown run. Evans went over for the extra point. Rocky Mount failed to return the ball on the kickoff. Green took the ball on his 47 for a ripping 13-yard off tackle gain to be followed by Everett to Evans double reverse which again put the ball in scoring position. Evans' pass to Simmons was good for a touchdown. Green went through center for the extra point putting the Tigers out in front 14-0.

"Big" Borden and "Rock" Edwards sparked the line in opening holes which Evans and Green went through for good gains, laying the ball on Rocky Mount's 42-yard line at the half.

Quarterback Wallace of Rocky Mount intercepted a pass and ran it back to the Tigers' 25-yard line from which he tossed the first touchdown pass. Gray made the extra point. Rocky Mount's passing attack changed the scene in the opening minutes of the final quarter. Trailing 21-7 the Lions went all out for passing, only when Dillard's backer was dropped back to pass defense. For the Tigers this quarter displayed Captain Evans' defense passing attack ability and that hard driving power of Jimmy's Green. Following Ed's Jimmy's 12-yard off tackle dash Evans went around and for 2 yards. Dillard's 60 minute quarter back rushed off a hard running 17 yard sprint for the fourth touchdown. Jackson kicked the extra point giving the Tigers a 21-7 lead. The Lions continued their passing attack through the fourth quarter. In the closing minutes a 29 yard pass put the Lions 12 yards from pay dirt. On a fake pass quarterback Wallace went off guard for the final touchdown. Extra point attempt failed. Score—Dillard 28 Rocky Mount 12.

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#### D. C. POLICE SET \$300 REWARD FOR SLAYER OF BOY 8

WASHINGTON (AP) — A reward of \$300 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the slayer of Harrison M. Walker, 8, was announced here last week by Superintendent of Police Robert J. Barrett. Harrison's body was found in Rock Creek under the Pennsylvania Avenue bridge last October 9, with his skull fractured and body cut 17 times.

Meanwhile a squad of 20 policemen have been brought into the case in an intensive check on all possible theories in the slaying. One possibility is that a group of boys may have killed the boy. Another is that a sex pervert is responsible.

#### RIOT VICTIMS SUE CITY FOR \$25,000 DAMAGES

CHICAGO (AP) — A Negro postal employee and his wife, whose newly-purchased apartment house in an all-white neighborhood was mobbed by hoodlums last July, filed suit last week demanding \$25,000 damages from the city of Chicago.

Roscoe Johnson and his wife Ethel are now living in the apartment which was the target for stones and gasoline flames tossed by a mob of 500 whites. More than 300 policemen were assigned to the scene and 16 were arrested in two days.
