Other contributions to the program were from Johnson Chapel Church, B. B. Komegay, Mrs. Louise Applewhite and Deacon S. D. E. Holt.

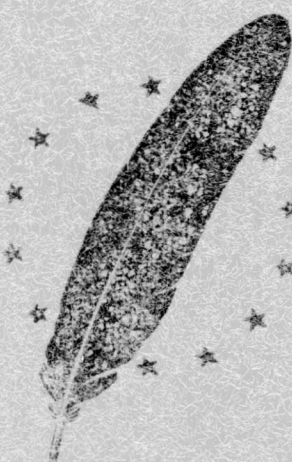
