ALA. CHIEF FINED AND SENTENCED FOR BEATING NEGROES

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—

Thomas L. Gant, former police chief of Flora Rica, Ala., was sentenced to two years of imprisonment and fined \$200 in District Judge C. B. Kennamer's court here last week for beating up five Negroes. Gant had pleaded guilty to the charges that he beat the men to make them confess to a crime.

He was released under \$2,000 bond and instructed to report back November 30 to begin sentence.
