LEMUEL GRAVES TO TAKE LABOR POST IN PARIS

WASHINGTON (ANP) — Lemuel Graves, Jr., national representative for the Pittsburgh Courier, offered his resignation as president of the Capital Press club at its dinner meeting held at Club Villa Bia last Saturday night.

Graves, who has covered the Washington scene for the Courier for the past three years, is taking leave to accept an appointment with the Labor Information Division of the European Rehabilitation Administration in Paris, France.

While employed on the Courier staff, Graves reported all news of national interest, mainly political. He traveled with President Truman on his Caribbean tour which included the Virgin Islands. He also traveled with Gov. Thomas Dewey on his special campaign trip through the West.

Before coming to the Courier, Graves began his newspaper work with the Carolina Tribune, worked for 12 years with the Journal and Guide of Norfolk, Va. During which time, he worked in almost every capacity offered in the newspaper business, but his duty was mainly that of a sport's editor. From 1943 to 1945 he served as war correspondent for the Journal

NAACP AID TO ORGANIZED LABOR

Cleveland — The achievements of the NAACP in efforts to outlaw the "white primary" and curb mob violence have been of great value to organized labor, Roy Wilkins, acting secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, told the Congress of Industrial Organizations in its 11th annual convention here last week.

While there are still terror and mobs in the South, "they do not dominate the scene as they once did," Mr. Wilkins said. "The overwhelming public opinion, once either on the side of the lynchers or silent and indifferent, now actively opposes mob violence."

In this new atmosphere, largely the result of the NAACP's 40-year fight against mob violence, "organized labor has been able to go forward with its organizing drive in the South," the NAACP official asserted.

Parallels in the legislative programs of the NAACP and the CIO were cited by the speaker. Both organizations, he said, want an FEPC, oppose the poll tax, and support other civil rights and social welfare legislation. Both had demanded repeal of the Taft-Hartley Labor Act.

WASHINGTON (ANP) — The National Fraternal Council of Negro Churches of the U. S. A., founded 13 years ago in Rochester, N. Y., upon a suggestion from the late Dr. L. K. Williams, president of the National Baptist Convention of America, had a formal opening and spectacular dedicatory ceremonies of its new headquarters, 318 Third Street, S. W., last Tuesday.

Rev. James M. Bracy, A.B., M.D., D.D., pastor of the First Baptist church in St. Louis, Mo., is president of the National Council of Negro Churches and presided at the epoch-making event. Religious leaders who held important places on the program were Dr. W. H. Jernagin of the Baptist church, founder and first director of the Washington Bureau; Bishop W. J. Walls, of the AME Zion Church, vice president at large; Bishop H. T. Medford, of the AME Zion Church and Dr. C. K. Stalnaker, executive secretary of National Religious organization.

Other dignitaries who gave brief remarks were Rev. Lester M. Suitt, bureau director; Dr. J. H. Randolph, Bishop H. V. Plummer and Elder Smallwood Williams.

President Harry S. Truman was among the many persons sending congratulatory messages.

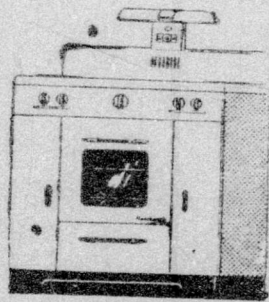

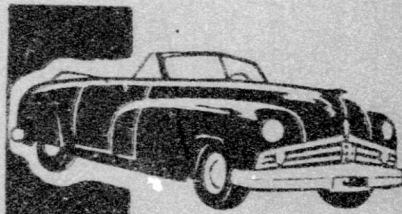
