ARKANSAS SOLO HAS OWN BRAND OF 'CIVIL RIGHTS'

WASHINGTON (ANI) — A so-called Arkansas plan calling for a more "peaceful settlement" of the controversial civil rights issues was recommended here last week by Rep. Brooks Hays of Arkansas.

Declaring his objections to proposed fair employment practices legislation, Hays called for the setting up of an advisory commission to discuss the employment problems with employers and employees.

"Express regret" that the administration plan is an out-of-date one, Hays said.

"We believe that the principle of equal pay for equal performance should be applied and that wages for opportunities for Negro workers must be sought."

Declaring that these advocating FEPC were doing this political job, Hays continued:

"Political bids for support of minority group outside the South will not stop this progress however, they will make the task more difficult and will play into the hands of the extremists who are quaquering behind the claim of states rights would arrest the social and economic progress of the south."

LIBERIA EXPORTS FIRST BANANA CROP

MONROVIA (ANI) — The first shipment of bananas from Liberia was sent to New Orleans last week. The shipment was an experiment. The Mississippi Delta Steamship Company through its president, H. S. Hecht, who recently visited Liberia along with Juan Trippe, president of Pan-American company, became interested and arranged for the shipment to the United States free of transportation charges.

Liberia has never shipped bananas or mangoes of the delicious bananas which she grows to the United States or to foreign lands because there are no refrigerators or ships stopping here, Frank E. Pinder, agricultural officer for the U. S. Economic Mission to Liberia, is spearheading all of these moves to get Liberian produce into regular commercial channels. This country has made great progress in producing agricultural products since the mission has been functioning here.

Last week Harold S. Sims, an officer of the U. S. State Department, Oscar Meier, head of the Economic Mission, Ambassador Edward R. Dudley, Secretary of State Gabriel L. Dennis and Frank E. Pinder, made a three day trip inland. Sims although a frequent visitor to the port in Monrovia, was surprised to see the thousands of acres which have been put under cultivation during the past several years. Cocoa, rubber, bananas, rice, oil palms, pineapples, etc., are growing in sufficient abundance to prove that Liberia has a great agricultural future.

Pinder a native of Key West, a graduate of Florida A. and M. College and a former employee of the U. S. Agricultural department in Washington, has chieftains and planters away off the beaten trails interested in the production of both tree and ground crops. He has won great popularity with Liberian government officials and the com-
