 TO SPEAK IN S. C.**

PALEIGH — "The Library In The Role Of An Educator," will be the topic of Mrs. Mollie Huston Lee, when she addresses the South Carolina Library Association, in Columbia, S. C., on April 7, 1950. Mrs. Lee is the librarian at the local Richard B. Harrison Library, and her South Carolina appearance will mark the first time a representative from Raleigh has addressed the group.

The following Friday, April 14, Mrs. Lee will be in Miami, Fla., to address the State Teachers Association and the Library Association. Mrs. Lee received her A. B. degree from Howard University in 1929, and has been librarian at the Richard B. Harrison Library, since 1935. She is supervisor of the N. C. Negro Public Libraries and has been a member of the A. L. A. since 1938.

Mrs. Lee is the author of the following articles: "Securing The Branch Library," "Opportunity Magazine," "Development of Negro Libraries in North Carolina," and co-author of a chapter on "Public Library Service for North Carolina Negroes in Libraries in North Carolina."
