Sixteen girls were selected by Mrs. Browning for further study. At this writing five of the six have successfully completed their instructions. In order that these six young girls might give back to the community something in return for the benefits they have derived from these sewing courses, they each are to

required to teach a teenage class in sewing. Following this process of simple multiplication, it would not take too long to reach a period in our community in which most of the girls interested in learning to sew would have had the successful opportunity of doing so.

I am reasonably sure that out of this small beginning there will develop some future designers and dress makers. So you can see that in many instances, what starts out to be a wholesome use of leisure time, can recreate itself into a livelihood. We wish to congratulate Sigma Gamma Rho for its interest shown in the young girls of our community.

I trust that the accomplishments will continue to warrant their continued concern. We hope that other interested groups will avail themselves of the opportunity to observe the many activity areas in which our youth participate. In doing so, I am certain that they will find like opportunities to be as active as ambitious and aspiring youth.
