

The 66 annual editions of the Hotel Red Book, which hotel managers collected in a recent New York drive, made a stack more than nine feet tall.

When the 66th edition of the Hotel Red Book, America's oldest travel directory, made its debut recently, hotel managers in New York City toured leading hotels in a 1903 Oldsmobile to round-up old




