Raleigh—Had a nice trip to beautiful Washington, D. C. last weekend. Purpose of the trip was to see relatives and friends and also to visit some of the historic shrines of our great American Capital. The latter plans were a bit hampered by rain and hot weather but with the help of a good guide book and a well-informed chauffeur, I managed to see quite a few places of interest.

You know that an Act was passed in 1790 directing that a district to contain the national capital be selected from an area along the Potomac River after a long controversy between North and South each of which wished the honor of being the seat of the Nation's government. Maryland ceded 64 square miles and Virginia gave over 36 square miles for the city to the Federal Government. Cornerstone of the first public building laid in 1792 and eight years later on June 11, 1800, Congress, President Adams, the Supreme Court and 126 Federal employees moved by boat and stage from the old capital at Philadelphia to still unfinished Washington in the Potomac swamps.

The city grew despite grumbling among Congressmen and officials and the inconveniences and the wild, desolate air of the new capital. Today thousands of visitors pour into Washington daily to see the magnificent splendor of that great city which was planned by a French visionary, Major Pierre-Charles L'Enfant, who had been engaged by General George Washington, the father of our Nation's capital as well as of our Country.
