

Border Belt Tobacco Sales Light; N. C. Markets Prep

RALEIGH — Sales were light and quality poor as nine South Carolina blue-cured tobacco markets of the Border Belt began sales this week.

The Departments of Agriculture has reported that prices held steady to opening levels which were about the same as last year's opening bids.

The opening day sales Monday totaled 2,638,533 pounds at an average price of \$2.05 as compared with 2,922,976 pounds the same markets sold on opening day last year at an average price of \$54.90.

"Average prices by grades during the second day of sales held fairly steady at quotations of opening day. The few changes that were observed were mostly normal changes of only \$1 per hundred with a few more losses than gains," the Ag Department says.

"The general quality was lower because of a sharp increase in non-descript and lower quality priming grades. The proportion of lugs and cutters was smaller. Volume of sales was reported fairly light on most markets."

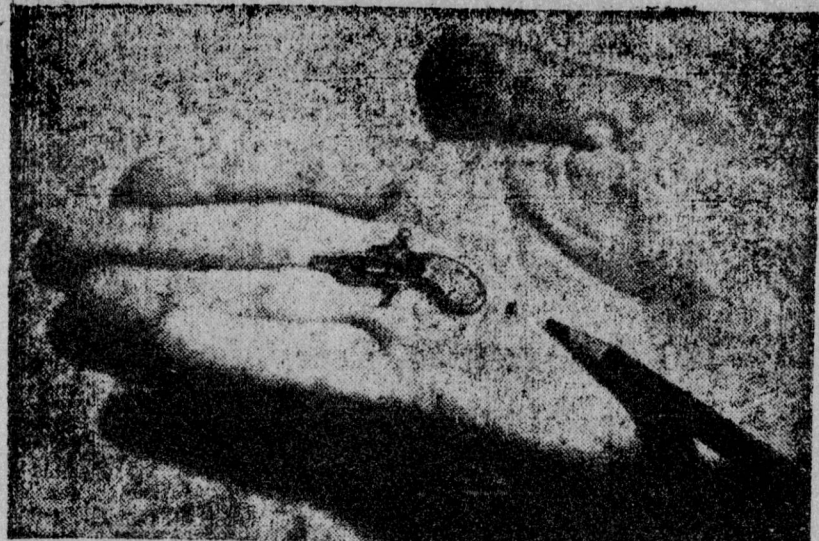

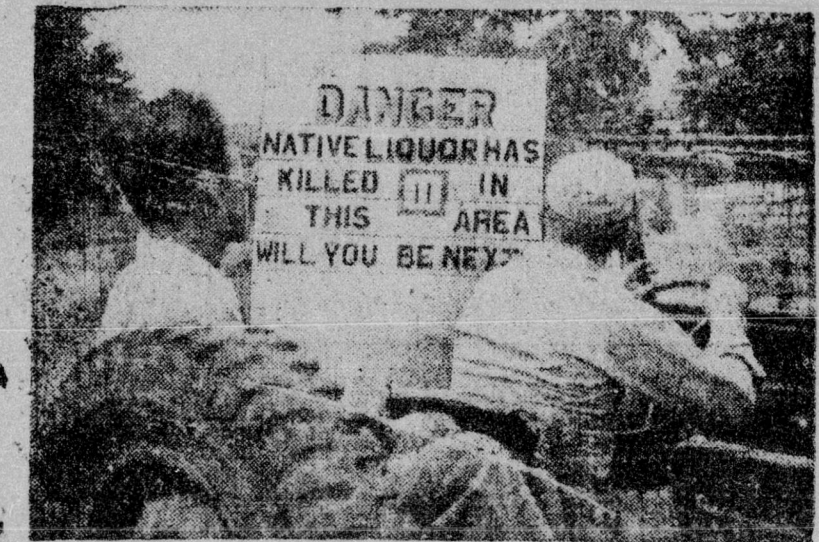

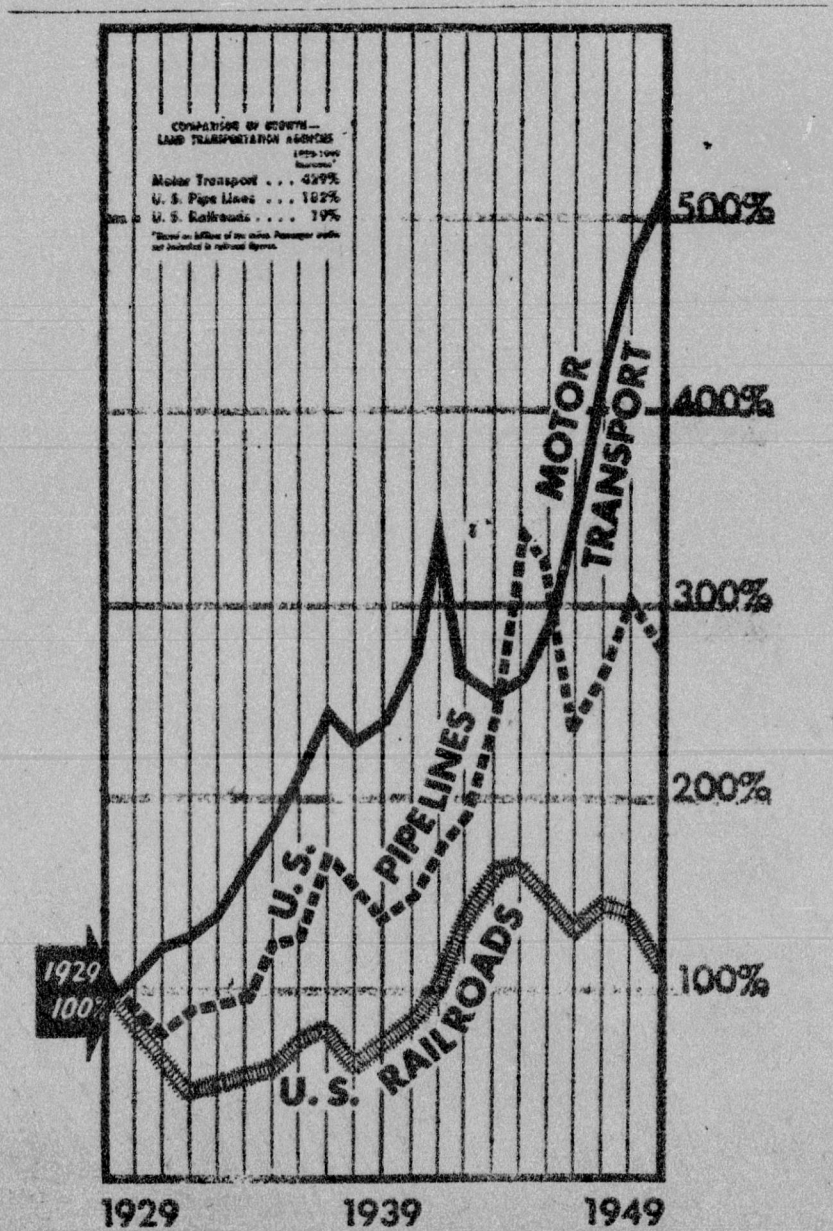
