WAKE RESIDENT BURIED MONDAY IN LIBERIA, W. A.

Funeral rites for Mrs. Cora Paul Thomas, Wake County native, and long-time missionary for the Lott Carey, Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, who died Sunday in Monrovia, Liberia, where she had served for almost 30 years, were held Monday in Brewerville, Monrovia, and burial was there beside her husband, the Rev. William H. Thomas, who died in 1942.

She had resided with her sister, Mrs. Blonnie Shade, 1600 Pender Street, Raleigh, since her retirement in 1946. She returned to Liberia in November, 1951, for a visit to her family and friends.

She was the oldest daughter of the late Rev. Harrison and Alice Parr and was born in Wake County near Shotwell. She attended Shaw University and Fisk University, and taught for several years in the public schools of Wake County, and at the Orphanage at Oxford.

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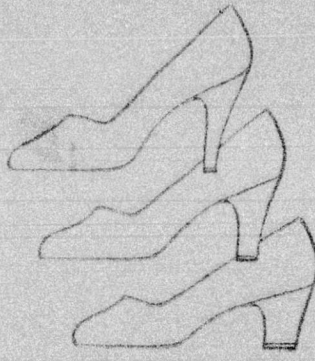

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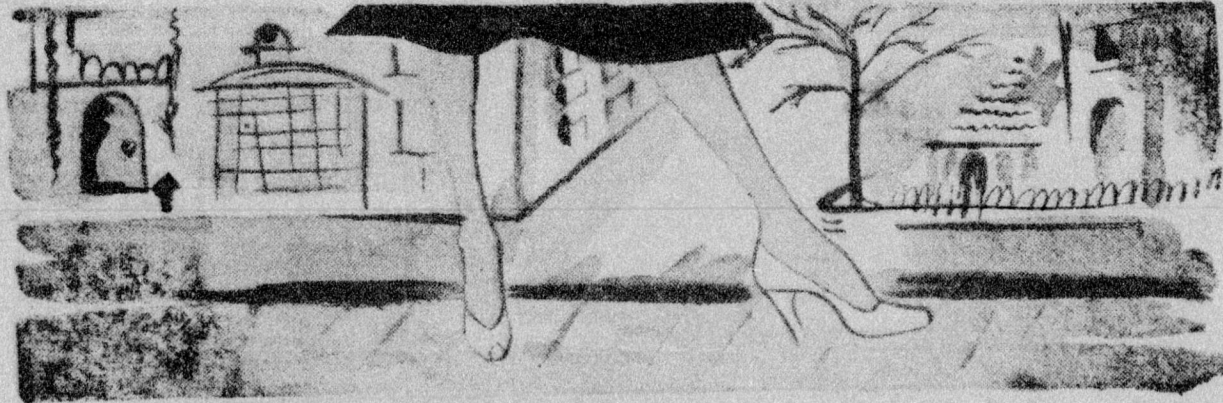
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
