

Port City Man Is Train Victim

Decapitated In Accident

PHILADELPHIA — The decapitated body of Joseph Sampson, 63, 1818 Catherine Street, was found about 7:30 a. m. Saturday on the Pennsylvania Railroad tracks between 49th and 50th streets.

Sampson formerly lived in Wilmington N. C. and was a member of one of that city's oldest families.

Police said Sampson was seen a patient at the West Coast hospital since last Thursday, and he died about 8 p. m. Friday from the hospital. The police of the 50th and Pine streets station reported that the man was found on Track No. 2 on which freight trains run.

Sampson's body was discovered by Barney Dean, a brakeman from the P. E. Division of the Great Ferry Avenue Yard. He called an assistant tanneryman, Charles Ryan who called the police.

The dead man was clothed in a bathrobe and bedroom slippers. He had walked nearly 3 blocks to reach the railroad tracks, police said. Mrs. Edna Sampson, the dead man's wife, told reporters "my husband was a very secure person, but was very ill physically."

The wife said she had been in the hospital for a week, and finally had to be taken to the hospital in a nervous wreck because of a fall. Mrs. Sampson said she had been a member of the 27th ward.

A letter written in the hospital house, dated Dec. 2, 1952, was found with the body. The letter was addressed to the Wilmington, N. C. office of the Pennsylvania Railroad. It was dated Dec. 2, 1952, and was signed "Joe Sampson".

Sampson's mother, Mrs. Edna Sampson, lives with her daughter-in-law, Mrs. William Sampson, in Wilmington. Viewing of the body was Tuesday night at the Jackson Funeral Parlors, 1001 N. 2nd Street, at which time "Prayer" services were held.

Burial services were held in the funeral parlors Wednesday. Mrs. Sampson came to Philadelphia at an early age and he is survived by his wife, mother, a sister, Mrs. L. O. Jones and a brother, E. L. Jones, both of New York City. He was a member of the Crucifixion church, 8th and Hanbridge streets.
