Woman, 34, Sent To Women's Prison Site

HIGH POINT — A 34-year-old woman, mother of three young children and common-law wife of the man she admitted killing, was sentenced in Guilford County Superior Court here Monday to an 18 to 25-year prison term for the shotgun slaying of her husband, 47, on Oct. 11.

Mrs. Lula Turner was found guilty on an amended charge of murder in the fatal shooting of Vance Tyson on October 11. Presiding Judge H. H. Hoke, Sr. before passing sentence, questioned Mrs. Turner closely regarding her relationship with her victim. The woman told him she shared a part of Tyson's apartment and did his cooking. She said that she had not worked for four months and that she

CHILD FOLLOWS POP IN DEATH

FAYETTEVILLE — A five-year-old girl followed her father in death here Monday night as the result of a Sunday automobile wreck on a highway near here. Little Miss Eunice McKee, 5, died at a local hospital Monday night. The young girl had been brought to the institution suffering serious injuries about the head and shoulder sustained in the Sunday afternoon crash in which her father, Elmer McKee, 47, was instantly killed and two other persons, including the mother, suffered serious injuries. According to investigating officers, McKee was driving the death car which crashed into a large pine tree just off the Fayetteville-Roseford Highway while traveling at a prohibitive rate of speed. Injured in the crash which claimed the driver's life were the daughter, Connie Maynor, 23, and Mrs. Malbie McKee, the wife. Both Maynor, a native of Roseford and Mrs. McKee are still confined to the local hospital in which the young girl died. Both suffered critical injuries. The McKees lived at Fayetteville, Route 2.

(Special To Carolinian) WASHINGTON, DC — Arguments, the outcome of which will determine the complexion of segregation in the nation, were begun before the United States Supreme Court Tuesday at a battery of NAACP lawyers headed by Thurgood Marshall, charged with a group of lawyers representing various Southern states, and including a former candidate for the presidency of the United States presented varying views on the legality of segregation in education. She is Mrs. Zachariah Keedirelang Matthews who spoke at Bennett as one of several colleges on her current itinerary of institutions she plans to visit. She is the wife of an instructor on African problems at a New York school, and is a graduate of the University of South Africa. She arrived in the United States about the first of September. Mrs. Matthews' son was arrested in a group of 28 persons who attended a native meeting, protesting against the suppression of Communist Act, passed recently. Modern Day "Cain-Abel" Story Heard By Police

HAMLET — A modern-day tale of a "Cain and Abel" incident was unfolded here last Thursday morning when a young local farmer surrendered himself at the local police station and told officers that he had killed his brother because the brother wouldn't let me sleep. Alvin Dumas admitted to police officers here that he shot his brother, Dewitt, because Dewitt advanced on him with a knife following Alvin's effort to quiet his brother. According to the story heard been friends of both brothers brought Dewitt, the father of five small children, to Alvin's home at a drinking party. Alvin says that he admitted his brother to his house, made a fire to keep him warm then went back to bed. Dewitt, however, began to "raise sand" Alvin said, and when he had to go into the room in which he had lodged his brother in an effort to restore peace. On his third trip into the room, Alvin says, Dewitt began to advance upon him with a knife and the two began to scuffle. During the scuffle, the story continues, Alvin came into possession of a pistol, which was discharged during the melee, with a bullet entering Dewitt's head through an eye. Dewitt died instantly and Alvin came into town to report the incident and to give himself up to the police. Investigation of the affair was still underway at CAROLINIAN presstime.

GRAVE-DIGGING 'LOVER' FACES MURDER TRIAL

ABERDEEN — The case of the "grave-digging lover" is docketed for the current term of the Moore County Superior Court which began sessions here Monday. Accused of burying his still-living "sweetheart" following a lover's spat is Melvin Morrison, who police officers report to be a "very cool character." Morrison is said to have buried Mrs. Louise Dowd McLaughlin alive in a shallow grave near here some three weeks ago when his Saturday-morning efforts at a reconciliation with the woman failed. Mrs. McLaughlin's lifeless body was dug up from a shallow pit in a nearby wooded area a week after she had been missing from her home here. The widow of a World War II casualty, the attractive young woman was reportedly "friendly" with her alleged murderer until shortly before the tragedy. She went to the Southern Pine Dept. office to buy a money order and attend to other business the day she was first noted missing. Because of their alleged split, Morrison was questioned after the body was found. His "coolness" when being shown the site of the make-a-shift grave in which the woman's body was discovered and failure to answer queries satisfactorily resulted in his having to face the charge of murder.
