Howard U. Coach Fired; Reason Is Kept A Secret

WASHINGTON (AP)—No light has yet been shed on the mysterious dismissal of football coach Edward L. Jackson from Howard University this week.

Neither the school, nor Jackson was willing to discuss the matter. Campus gossip claims that Jackson was ousted because of a plan to subsidize athletics which is contrary to Howard's strict policy of permitting no special financial aid.

Jackson only commented that the "suddenness" of the school's action has been a shock to me. He admitted on the situation later in the week.

Dr. Nordehn Johnson, president of Howard, would give no hint as to the reason behind the move. He only said that he preferred that any statement would come from Jackson. He was afraid to say anything, he said, because it might hurt the individual in a case like this.

The 45-year-old coach has been at Howard for the past eight years, during which time his teams have won 43 games, lost 24 and tied two. He served as coach at Delaware State College and Johnson C. Smith before coming to Howard.

Dr. Johnson, who is now in his 27th year as President of Howard, has been known for his opposition to commercialization in collegiate athletics. He is described as being against any form of special subsidization.

Howard offers no athletic scholarships but some athletes do have academic scholarships. Jackson's ouster came soon after he had ended a successful season in which the Howard Bison won six games, lost two and tied one.

Hampton Tops Union

HAMPTON, Va. — On December 10, the Hampton Institute basketball team defeated the Virginia Union team in a game when they met in the Virginia Union gym in Richmond.

The two teams met in an exhibition game on November 22 when they played on the Pirates' home court.
