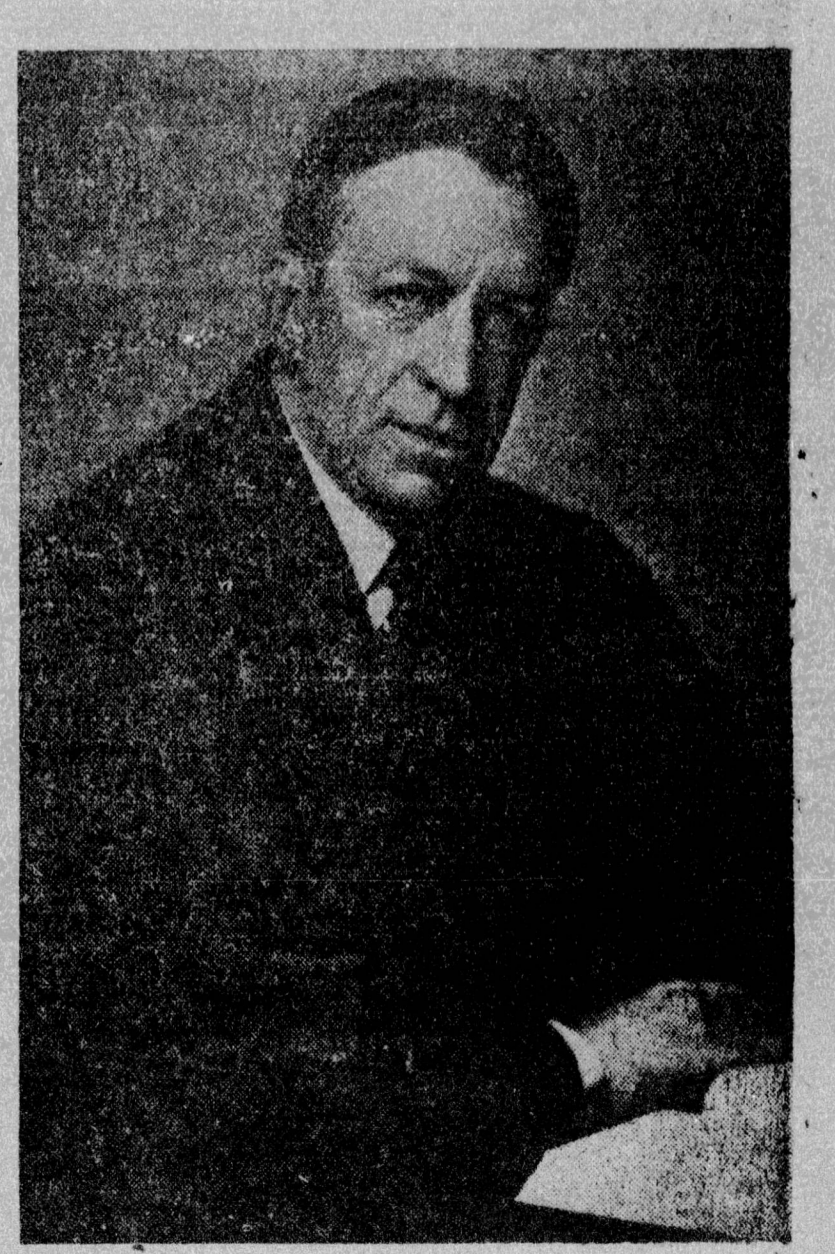

Judge Waring has distinguished himself as the symbol of strengthening America by assuring democracy for all. The Fraternity's plaque will be presented to the Judge by Ali Sastroamidjojo, the first Indonesian Ambassador to the United States. The Ambassador received his law degree from the University of Leyden in 1927 and is the author of many articles, among them are "A Survey of Indonesian Nationalist Movement" (INDONESIAN LIFE, March-April 1947) and "The Status of the Republic of Indonesia in International Law" (with Robert Nelson, COLUMBIA LAW REVIEW, March 1949). Ambassador Ali Sastroamidjojo has the distinction of serving as deputy minister of information under President Sukarno, Secretary General of the state defense council at Jogjakarta. In 1947 he was sent on his first important diplomatic mission as a member of the Republican Delegation to the Inter-Asian Relations Conference at New Delhi, India. In 1948, Mr. Sastroamidjojo was spokesman for his country before the U. N. Security Council which met at
