MORGANTON — Russ Miller, 14-year-old Rutherfordton, N.C. resident was injured fatally in an automobile accident near here Saturday.

State Highway Patrolman J. L. Gandy said Miller's car, apparently was proceeding when it ran off a rural road and overturned twice, skidding into a tree, died en route to a hospital here.

It was Burke County's 14th highway death of the year.

There are many social activities on the calendar for the week and Sunday is pastoral day for Rogers Chapel CME and St. Augustine F. W. Baptist expect to see you around.


