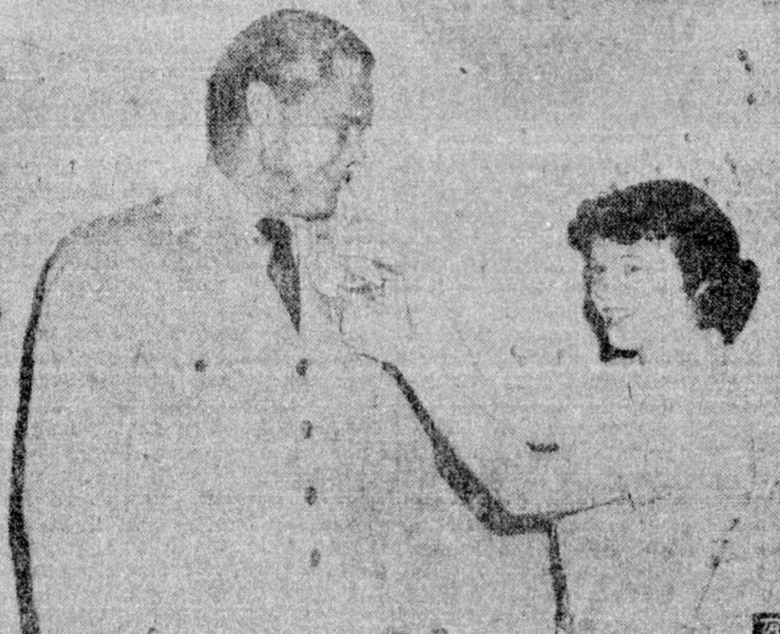

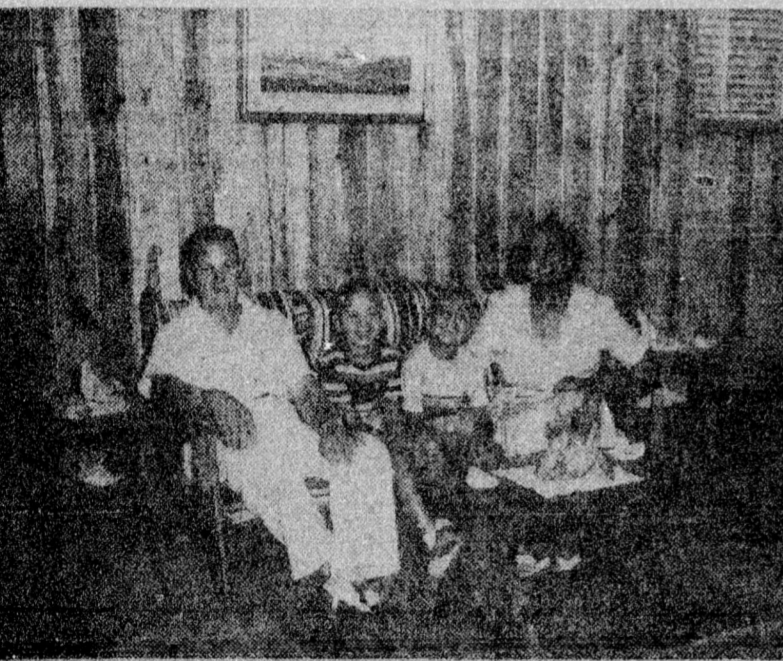

### • Voted "Elk Of Distinction" For "Outstanding Service"

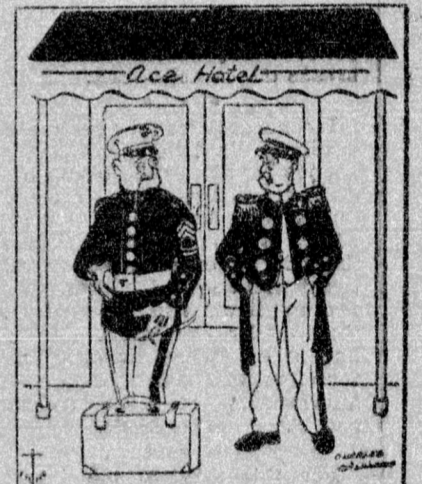

### IT'S BLISTER TIME



With its round of tennis, golf, beach jaunts and dancing in the evening, vacation time is often blister time. It is easy to forget that winter-softened hands and feet need a chance to harden up to the strenuous demands made upon them. Try to give them their chance, but if you do acquire a blister don't puncture it or let it be rubbed raw. Protect it from further rubbing and keep dirt out by covering it with one of the skin-like Band-Aid Plastic Strip bandages—either plain or mercurchrome pad. The plastic strip won't be noticeable, for it is skillfully flesh-toned and textured. It won't loosen or come off when you wash or bathe, but it will wash clean, without getting soggy, for the plastic can't soak up water.



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
