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POLICE CHIEF WARNS AGAINST FLIM-FLAMMERS

WILMINGTON — Wilmington's chief of police, J. J. Padrick, said this week that flim-flammers are in operation in Wilmington, and he urged the public to be on the guard against the smooth-operators who fleece large sums from unsuspecting victims.

Twice within the last week two Negroes have been tricked of their savings. More than \$500 has been lost in this manner, the chief added.

According to the chief, here's the way the flim-flammers work: The flim-flammers usually approach a victim who is carrying a large sum of money and relate a tale of having "found" a pocket-book or wallet with several hundred dollars in it.

The victim is then told that if he will add his savings to the amount the others have reportedly found — they will "split the pot" with him.

When the victim turns over his cash to be added to the sum held by the others they quickly vanish, leaving the victim minus.

If you are approached in such a manner, here's what you should do: Be wary of persons claiming to have found sums of money or valuables and offering to split the loot if the police are not notified. Contact the police at once.

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NEW AMERICAN AMBASSADOR TO LIBERIA — Jesse D. Locker, newly appointed U. S. ambassador to Liberia, is a veteran politician in Cincinnati where he served six terms in the city council. First elected in 1911, he has served consecutively since then, and is the only Negro to serve as its president pro tem. A close friend of Senator Robert A. Taft, Locker was graduated from the Howard university law school. He then practiced law in Cincinnati for more than 20 years. He also has been active in church and civic affairs. Locker is a board member of the Walnut Hills Branch of the YMCA, a director of the Catherine Booth Home and Hospital, an elder of the Wechman Avenue Christian church, a founder and president of an organization for the blind and holds membership in the Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity and Alpha Number One BPOE of W. He is married and has four daughters. — (ANP)

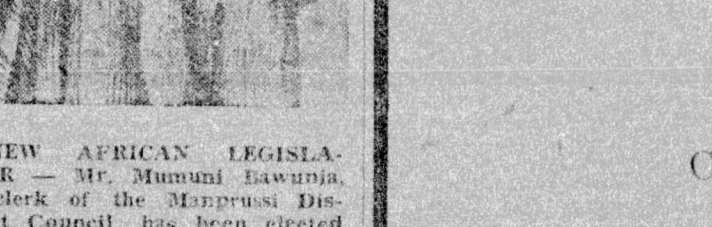

NEW AFRICAN LEGISLATOR — Mr. Mumuni Bawunia, a clerk of the Mamprussi District Council, has been elected by the Electrical College of the Northern Territories as a territorial member of the Legislative Assembly. He replaces A. Budu Mumuni, Dorimon-Na, whose seat in the Legislative Assembly became vacant when he ceased to be a member of the Northern Territories Council. Bawunia polled 19 votes as against 18 votes cast for Imoru Sallu, a school teacher and 12 for Abudu Humani, Dorimon-Na. Born in 1921 at Nalagu in the Mamprussi District, Bawunia was educated at the Gambia Native Authority School and the Tamale Middle Boys' School. Leaving school 10 years ago, he entered the Tamale Teacher Training college and became a teacher at the Nalerigu Middle School three years later. In 1951 he was appointed State Secretary to the Mamprussi District. — (ANP)

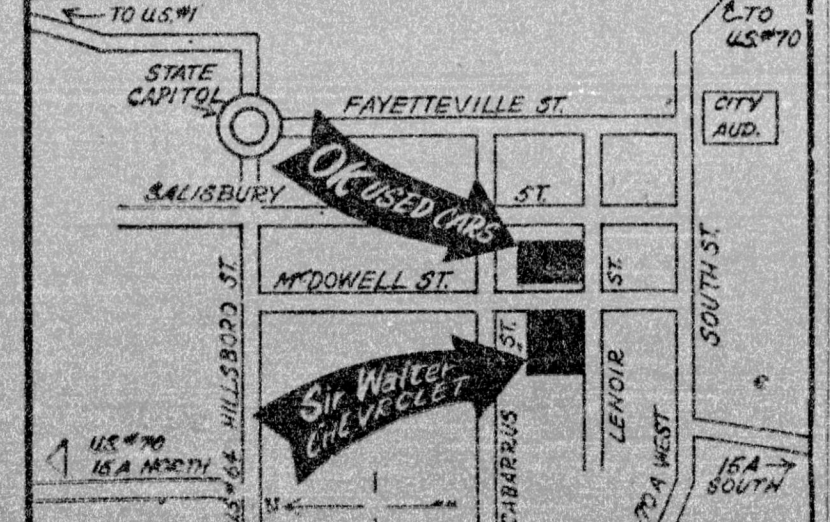


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
