GARDEN TIME

With the coming of frost and a small amount of a fertilized deciduous trees will begin to lose their leaves. This often presents a problem for the home owner, who both in town and country, who wants to have a neat yard, lawn or garden. The usual method is to rake up the leaves and burn them or to take them into the street and have the city trucks cart them away.

But, as deficient as our soils are, a wasteful procedure. It is true, in organic matter burning leaves are of course, but the leaves must be raked off of the lawn grass—especially newly planted grass—or they will smother the grass. The thing to do is to take the leaves and make a leaf compost. Pile and rot them so that they can be spread on the garden and incorporated with the soil or used as a mulch around shrubs—especially azaleas. Leaves are difficult to rot if they are just raked up and piled into a large pile. The compost should be built up in layers that will be beneficial rather than harmful.

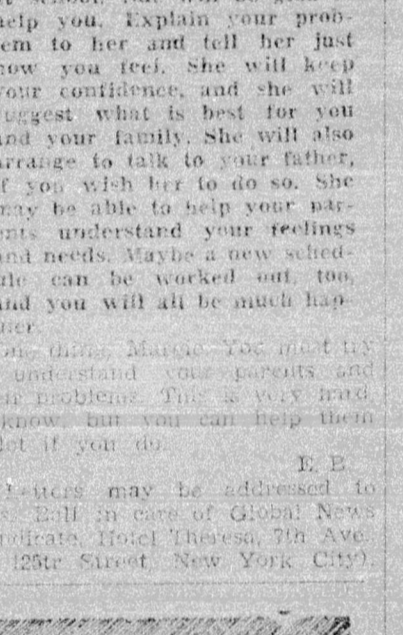

Portable Freezer on Fruehauf Keeps "Holiday" Troop on Ice



A special Fruehauf trailer equipped to produce the equivalent of 40 tons of ice in 24 hours is keeping the Holiday On Ice Troop in operation on a world-wide tour. The amount of ice will maintain a 100-foot-wide by 100-foot-long rink.

The new, which is now in Japan, is independent of local equipment. It is a complete unit, housed in a special custom built trailer frame. Fruehauf trailer weighs 38,000 pounds with equipment. It was built completely in the shops of the Fruehauf Milwaukee, Wisconsin, branch. Its equipment comprises two Vilter 8x8 compressors and brine coolers, two 60-horsepower electric motors, two 10-horsepower pumps and a complete set of Gutier-Hammer controls.

Similar equipment is also making other trips including all parts of the United States, Europe, South America and Mexico, bringing ice to parts of the world which have never seen anything comparable. The present Japanese venture is a "first" in that country.

STATE COLLEGE ANSWERS

QUESTION: Is corn better for cattle when fed as silage?

ANSWER: The silo gives from 5 to 30 per cent more feeding value to the corn crop than when harvested and fed as grain fodder. There is no waste of stalks and husks, which contain about 40 per cent of the edging value of the corn plant when placed in the silo.

QUESTION: What chemical should I use for weed and nematode control in my tobacco plant bed and when is the best time for treatment?

ANSWER: October is the month for treating plant beds and one pound of granular per square yard gives satisfactory weed control and costs less than most other chemicals.

Also, 16-6-2 supplies the fertilizer needed for plant growth and contains cyanamide and fertilizer rad-area for weed control.

QUESTION: How can I prevent weed floras in milk?

ANSWER: The floras are caused by many weeds in the field, and are prevented through the development and use of better pastures.

State Colleges HINTS TO HOMEMAKERS

ISH, MEAT, AND POULTRY—Strips of bacon placed lengthwise in the bottom of the pan will prevent a meat loaf from sticking and also add flavor to the meat.

MEAT: Put the fat around the edges of steaks or chops before broiling and the meat will be fat on the rack.

WHEN STUFFING A TURKEY, you should stuff it loosely and use one cup of stuffing for every pound of turkey.

CANNED MEAT CAN BE REMOVED from the tin easily by placing the can on the back of the stove or in hot water long enough to melt the fat next to the tin. If meat is canned in glass, heat it in water.
