Millions Held

"Frankly we don't want to go far toward equalizing the schools, but it will be a mighty big step in that direction," the speaker claimed.

In the recent \$2 billion total, \$50 million have been planned for building public schools. One half of this amount, \$25 million, would be used as part of the plan to build Negro schools up to 1954.

According to recently published figures attributed to members of the State Department of Public Instruction and state officials, a minimum of \$100 million would be necessary to "approach equality" seriously in white and Negro schools.

We can't have the money or the potential resources, unless we divert all revenue for that end. It's a regrettable fact that discrimination has existed for so long that present efforts to equalize the schools by spending similar sums for white and Negro children actually serve

According to all reports available, after the police arrived, they called the corner who killed the killing "justifiable homicide" after listening to Dunn's story.

A fact that is very disturbing is that although the police were given the name and address of the slain man, they made no effort to contact or notify Debnam's family, but took it upon themselves to call an undertaker of their own choosing. The killing took place around midnight, about two blocks from Debnam's home but the family says it was not notified of the killing until the next morning and then by a telephone call from a friend.

According to reports, Debnam had been a frequent visitor in the Dunn home, a run-down three room shack with a "condemned" sign posted on its front. Here, a mid reported scenes of filth, drinking and debauchery, lived Dunn and his two daughters, ages 14 and 9. Here also live Dora Lee Peobles reported to have been the girlfriend of both Dunn and Debnam.

Dora Lee claims she was a paying roomer in this house, her rent being paid by the Wake County Welfare Department. That report if true, raises the question of why should the welfare department pay to have one of its wards live in a "condemned" house. Another question is, to whom was the money paid since the property is not owned by Dunn.

Safety Program Sought

RALEIGH—The former director of North Carolina's highway safety program says the State and a half motorist need an active organization to represent him in vital tax, safety and insurance matters.

Ronald Hocht of Wendell, a former member of the State Legislature from Johnston County, has turned the Motorist's Protective Association, Inc., along with two other men, they are Paul Yearger, Vice President, and Milton Howell, Secretary.

The organization, which recently received its charter, is setting up State offices here.

Hocht, who was a principal figure in the founding of the North Carolina highway safety program in 1953, says he has long felt that the people who drive cars in North Carolina need an active organization that will protect their interests in the face of high pressure business and will work for practical safety measures to cut the bloodshed on our highways.

"I want to work for more economical insurance rates," he said. "I think the average man needs a spokesman, an organization that can study automobile accident insurance rates, and that can speak in behalf of the automobile owner at any time when insurance rates are reviewed."

"At present a motorist must pay \$640 tax on a \$2,000 new car delivered to him in North Carolina. That hurts too many people who want to buy cars and too many who want to sell them. Then, too, there is that old and worrisome business of gasoline costing more in North Carolina than it does in neighboring states. We propose a thorough and continuing study of tax practices with the idea of strongly opposing any unjustified increase in taxes affect-

ing automobiles owners and with the hope that some may be lowered."

"Each session of the State Legislature passes a number of laws affecting the motorist. It will be part of our job to study these laws and to send simple digest of these laws to each member of MPA. In addition, other information directly or indirectly concerning motorists will be furnished MPA members."
