## Fair Bluff Mother Says Policeman Raped Her

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### Dr. Albert W. Dent Leads UNCF Sponsored Forum

NEW YORK — Dr. Albert W. Dent, president of Dillard University and recently elected president of the National Health Council, will head the list of participants in the first United Negro College Fund "Point Four At Home" to be held Tuesday, October 27, at the Chesapeake Club here.

Dr. Dent, with Dr. Eugene H. Jones, Jr., medical director of the John A. Andrew Hospital and Ernest E. Neal, director of the Rural Life Council at Tuskegee Institute, Alabama, make up the panel which will discuss national health and social welfare problems with emphasis on those directly affecting the Negro population.

This year's Forum, the fifth in an annual series, is presented under the joint sponsorship of the New York clubs of 11 Eastern women's colleges, the American Association of University Women, New York City Branch, and the United Negro College Fund. Mrs. Arthur A. Cohen is program chairman of the October 27 forum session.

### Atlanta Univ. Enrolls 659

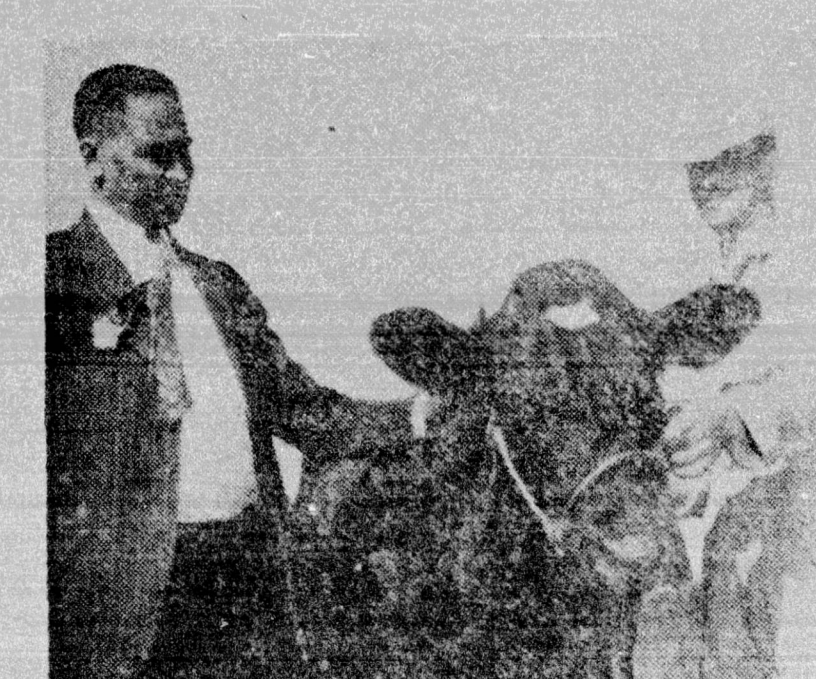

Dr. Dent will report on Tuskegee's rural life and health program. The Institute has been utilizing "Point Four" techniques to improve the education, economic and health level of the area in which it is located.

Dr. Dent, who was elected president of the National Health Council in May of this year, is a member of the Ford Foundation Committee for the Advancement of Education. Prior to becoming president of Dillard University in New Orleans in 1941, he was superintendent of the University's Flint-Goodridge Hospital for nine years.

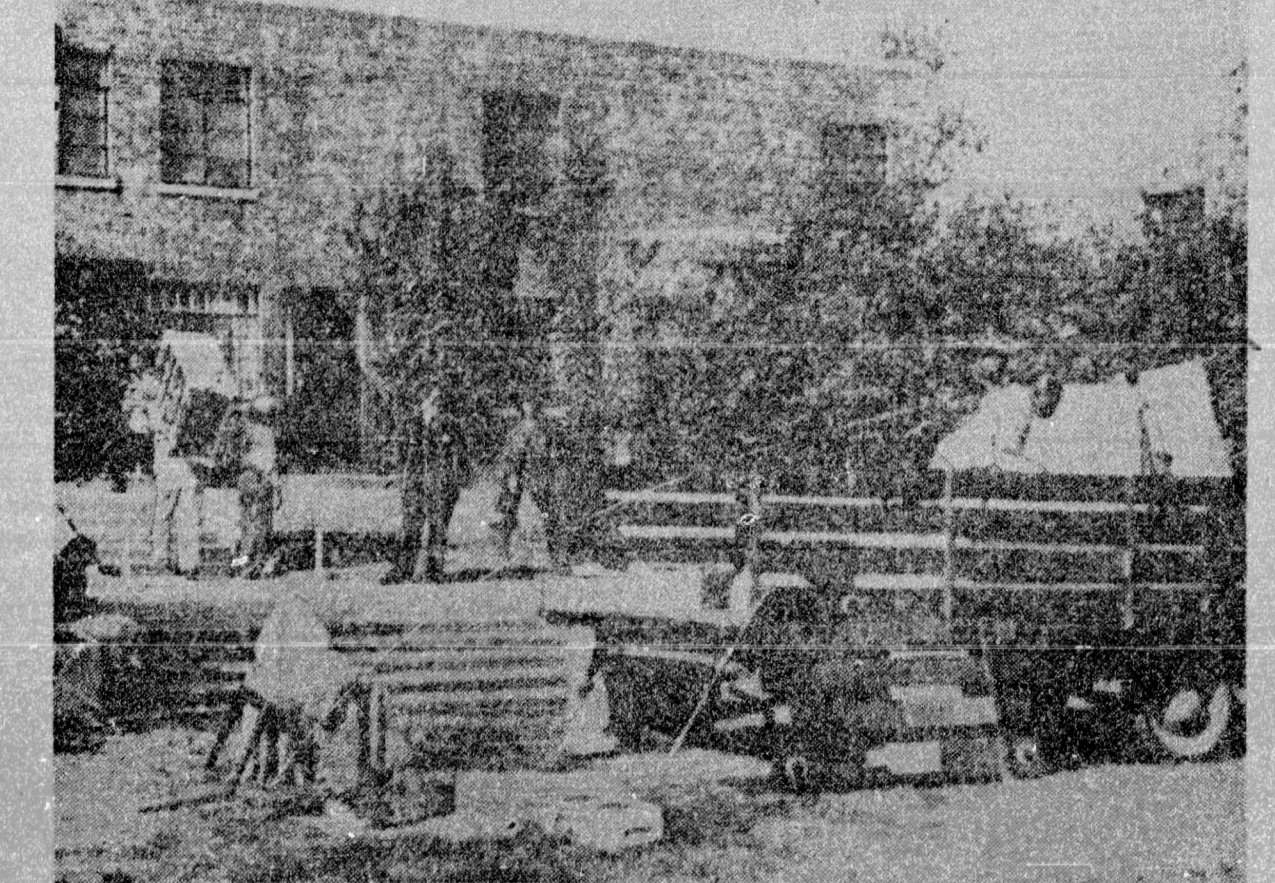
### Tubercular Convict Still At Large

### Escapes Road Gang

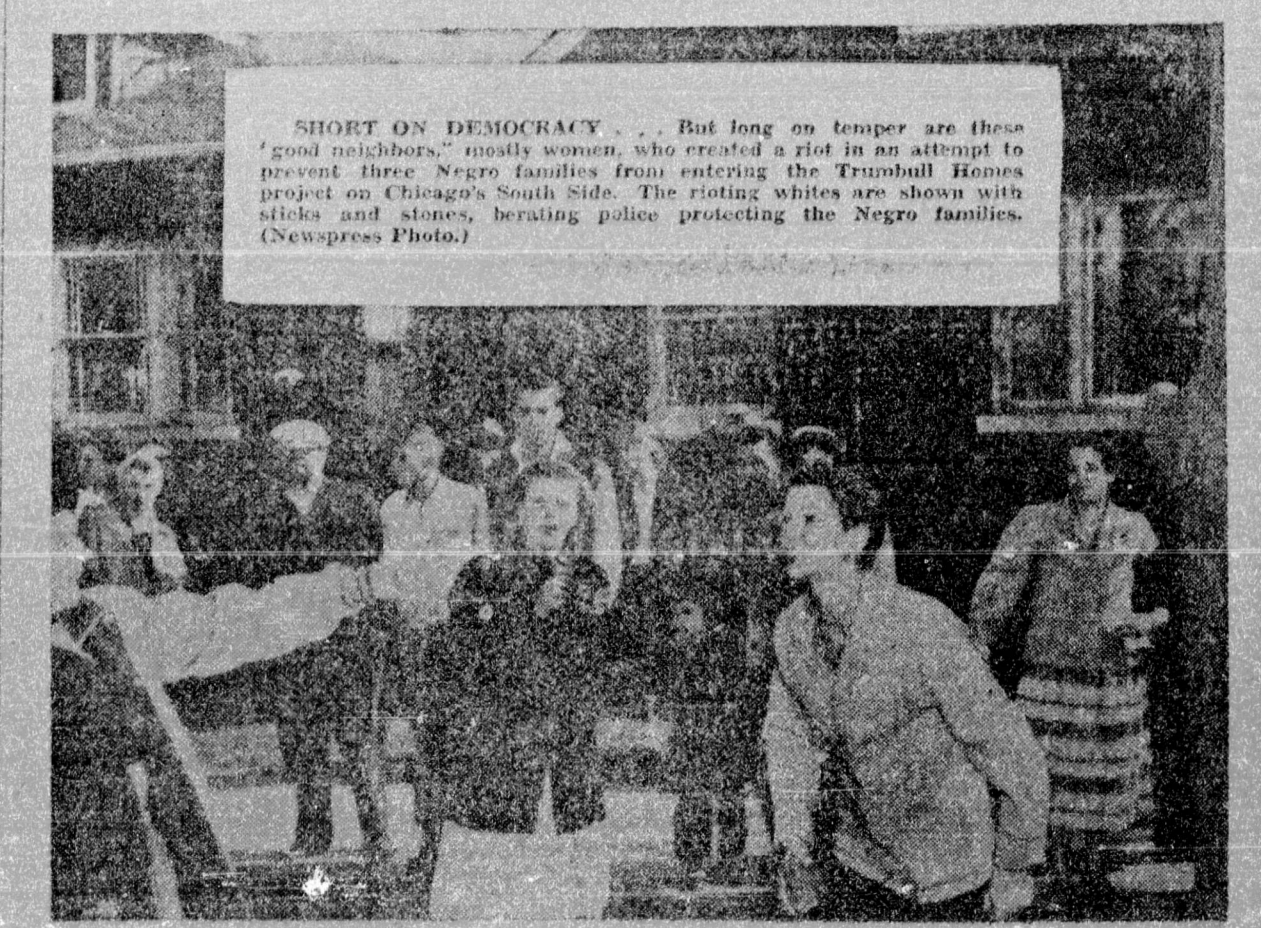

"My dress, which belonged to my sister, was stolen and the thieves went from my sister, Mrs. Sue M. Eady, went to Mayor Bob King, but she seemed more interested in the dress than in what had happened to me."

"Mr. Duncan told me he would kill me if I told anyone about what had happened. I promised him that I would not so that I could get away, but instead of letting me go, he said that we would have to arrest me for a reason. The reason was to have an excuse for putting me in that cab. I was taken to the jail and charged with being drunk."

A colored man was in jail at the time and another was brought in after I was placed there. Both were charged with being drunk. One was Furman Krueber and the other was Lee Floyd. (Editorial note: Mrs. Johnson could not recall Furman's last name, and the JOURNAL may or may not have it spelled correctly.)
