

### Burlington Pharmacist On City Recreation Board

BURLINGTON (Special) — Dr. W. R. Perry, prominent Burlington pharmacist, has been appointed to the city's Recreation Commission. He is the first of his race so honored.

Announcement of the appointment by the Burlington City Council followed a Council meeting on November 3.

A near change in the city ordinance allows the appointment of three additional members of the Recreation Commission. Two other vacancies remain.

Dr. Perry, 32, has been active in recreation work among Negroes for several years.

He operates the Worth Street Drug Store. A native of Warren County, Dr. Perry came to Burlington in 1931. He has ac-

tively engaged as a pharmacist since that time. Dr. Perry is a graduate of Mercer Medical School of Pharmacy at Nashville, Tenn.
