

Judge Hubert Delany Closes NAACP Meet

SAVANNAH, Ga. — The Honorable Hubert T. Delany, Judge in the Court of Domestic Relations in New York City and a lifetime member of the NAACP Board of Directors, will deliver the featured address at a Freedom Rally in the First Baptist Church here on Sunday, February 22. The rally will be the closing sessions of a three-day conference of delegates from branches, youth councils and college chapters of the NAACP in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee.

Work sessions on Saturday, February 21 will deal with the organization and techniques to be used in securing first-class citizenship. Legal items will be discussed by Attorney Spottwood W. Robinson, III of Richmond, Virginia and Robert L. Carter of New York, both members of the NAACP Legal Staff. It is expected that emphasis will be placed on eliminating segregation in education since the five remaining southern states which have not opened state schools of higher education to Negroes are in the Southeast Region.

A discussion of preparation for living in a desegregated society will be led by Dr. D. J. Odom, Jr., Dean of Students and Director of Religious Activities of Morris Brown College in Atlanta.

Other conference participants listed are: Glorster B. Current, Director of NAACP Branches; Herbert Hill, NAACP Labor Relations Assistant; Kelly M. Alexander, president of the North Carolina NAACP State Conference; J. M. Hinton, president of the South Carolina NAACP State Conference; Clarence Mitchell, director of the Washington Bureau and L. R. Johnson, Youth Adviser for Georgia. Mrs. Ruby Hixley, Southeast Regional Secretary will direct the conference.

Hampton Institute Ends Religious Emphasis Week

HAMPTON, Va. — The 1954 Religious Emphasis Week held on the campus of Hampton Institute was led by Rev. Leo L. Sheppard, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Columbia, Missouri and Dr. Samuel Enoch Stump, professor and head of the Department of Philosophy and lecturer in Jurisprudence in the Law School of Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tennessee.

The several sessions began with the Sunday worship service held in Memorial Church with Rev. Sheppard preaching on the subject, "A Christian Basis For Life Today," and Dr. Stump speaking at Vespers in Ogden Hall on the subject, "A New Certainty." Dr. Stump later during the week spoke to a faculty seminar on the subject, "Religion and the Odyssey of Man." He returned as an introductory statement the earlier concepts of the meaning of life as exemplified in the teachings of Lactantius, St. Augustine, the scientist, Pascal, wherein the main conclusion was that the answer to man's restlessness is to receive affection from something whether a thing or a human being. There is that constant urge and drive

possessed by all persons to seek of man's love is not permanent. He finds that change continues to rise in his relation to the object of his affection. Stump illustrated that man is incomplete as far as himself is concerned. He stated that man needs love and affection although in the earlier theories as well as everyday experiences, things are subject to change. Therefore, what he seeks is eternal and the answer for such love is God. The speaker referred to the scientist, Pascal, who requested his students to answer a series of questions among which was "Why don't you believe in God?" He urged men to be there was a God with the statement, look how great the stakes are — what can you lose, but the chance to win everything. This philosophy was known as the "Pascal Wager."

Too often a high trade-in allowance is more than offset by an inflated or excessive selling price. His suggestion was to "Buy your car by the pound!" Divide the total quoted selling price of the automobile by its weight in pounds, and arrive at the price per pound. Then compare this price per pound on the various cars under consideration. The lower the price per pound, the greater the value. All cars are made of pretty much the same materials — steel, glass, textiles, rubber — so you can't go very far wrong using price per pound as a measuring stick of value!
