LAWS FOR HISTORIANS
Cicero, in Book II, Chapter IV, Section 22 of his "De Oratore" laid down rules for historians, and Pope Leo XII paraphrased these rules in 1863 in "On Historical Studies".

SALISBURY — Livingstone College received \$50,723.83 during the celebration of the 100th birthday anniversary of its founder, Dr. Joseph Charles Price, on Founder's Day here February 10th. A throng of church people led by the Board of Bishops of the A.M.E. Zion Church made the annual pilgrimage to the college to pay memorial tributes to the founder and
