### Dr. Fisher, Shaw Prof. Is Author Of Many Books

Shaw University paid honor to one of her faculty members, Dr. Miles Mark Fisher of Durham, in recognition of his most recent book entitled "Negro Slave Songs in the United States," which is receiving wide acclaim. The program was held Wednesday night in the West Campus Auditorium. In a statement regarding the thesis of the book, Dr. Fisher said that he believes that the Negro spirituals and songs of the antebellum South may have been more than simply musical expressions. He interprets them as the oral historical documents of a people. A review of the book was made by Professor Cudbert A. Jones, Department of History, North Carolina College at Durham, who stated that this is the most significant book ever written on the Negro, and that the whole evaluation and opinion of the Negro will have to be re-done.

Dr. Fisher received his Ph.D. from the University of Chicago, his D. D. from Shaw University where he is now professor of Church History. He is also pastor of the White Rock Baptist Church in Durham. Previous books by Dr. Fisher include "The Master's Slave—Elijah John Fisher", "Virginia Union University and Some of Her Achievements", and "A Short History of the Baptist Denomination". The recent book was published for The American Historical Association by Cornell University Press, Ithaca, N. Y.

Dr. Margaret Just Butcher, professor of English, of Howard University and militant, Washington, D. C. school board member was the main speaker at the 11 o'clock worship services at St. Paul AME Church. Dr. Butcher's address was timely, eloquent and thought-provoking. She directed the congregation to examine our present problem, desegregation in the light of positive precepts which were the main springs of democracy even during the time of the controversy regarding slavery World War II emphasized the "oneness of people—citizens of the world, for there is no difference in people based on color, but only differences based on opportunity. Segregation in the United States is our most potent weapon against world leadership," continued Dr. Butcher turning to the schools of Washington, D. C., Dr. Butcher said that only recently has any attempt been made to equalize school facilities despite the fact that the first public schools for white pupils was established in 1847 while Negro pupils in the beginning were placed in a church.

"Negro citizens must reevaluate their thinking in the light of rapid changes and drop their fears. 'We must,' said Dr. Butcher, 'be prepared to pay a price of calculated risk to secure desegregated schools for our children. The law is not sufficient to solve the problem, education must go along with law.' 'As long as we have God on our side as Joe Louis said, 'We have nothing to fear', she concluded.

The Rev. L. S. Penn, pastor of St. Paul, conducted worship services. Mrs. Hattie Edmondson presided. Dr. Marguerite Adams, counsellor and Professor of Psychology of Shaw, who introduced the speaker. Music was furnished by the Choristers with Mr. R. Herndon Toole as organist.
