



S. Africa Has Segregation Problems

NEW YORK — Segregation is the most pressing problem in South Africa, according to the Rev. Martin J. Barrett-Kerr.

Writing in the current issue of the Episcopal Church News, the priest asserted that the dominant National Party of Prime Minister Malan is aiming at "the maximum segregation that is practical."

"In the long run," the Episcopal Church News says, "the Nationalist Party is bound to fall." But in the meantime, some violence is bound to occur.

The most dangerous piece of pro-segregation legislation, according to the priest, is the so-called Bantu Education Bill passed last year. The bill was presented in such a manner that it was designed to fit the native for its subordinate place in society.

The bill provides for facilities to barely educate the Negro. It would permit any further education only to Negroes who are teachers, nurses and other professional people needed in the economy.

Other provisions are for separation of natives into their old language groups, their ejection from the two remaining universities who now live in a modest manner, and the reduction of liberal missionaries.

A major force against these policies, the Episcopal Church News sums up, is church activities in which all men worship equally. And in spite of much difficulty and interference, the Church will go on doing its best to help eventually eliminate segregation in South Africa.

FARMERS EXPECT GOOD TOBACCO CROP DESPITE WEATHER

RALEIGH, N. C. — (ANP) — Pender county farmers have their fingers crossed and are hoping for the best as for this year's tobacco crop is concerned.

V. T. Mantzby, Negro county agent for the Agricultural Extension Service, says that in spite of all the adverse weather which brought about the spread of tobacco diseases and intensified the insect problem, "it appears that most farmers will produce a fairly good crop of tobacco."

Mantzby says many farmers have indicated that they are not expecting as high a yield as last year, but that the quality will be good.

In general, says Mantzby, tobacco is not obtaining its normal height this year before maturing. To offset this, many farmers are allowing a sucker to grow at the top of the stalk in order to gain two or three extra



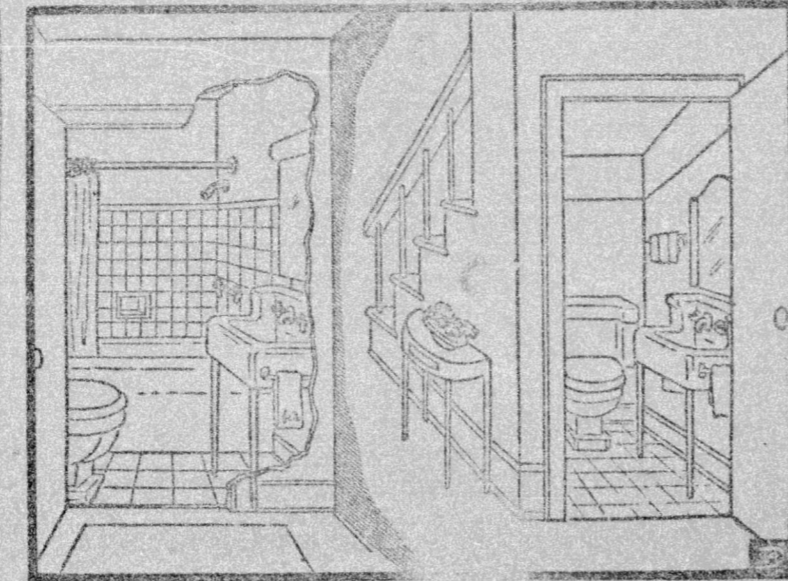

Addition of Second Bath Is Simple and Profitable

There are any number of possibilities for the location of an extra bath: in an unused closet; at the end of a hallway; in the space under the stairs; in the sewing room or the butler's pantry; or even in a corner of a large room.

The cost of a complete new bath is surprisingly low, — usually well under \$1,000 for the piping, installation and fixtures. Dollars cannot measure the extra comfort and convenience it will provide.

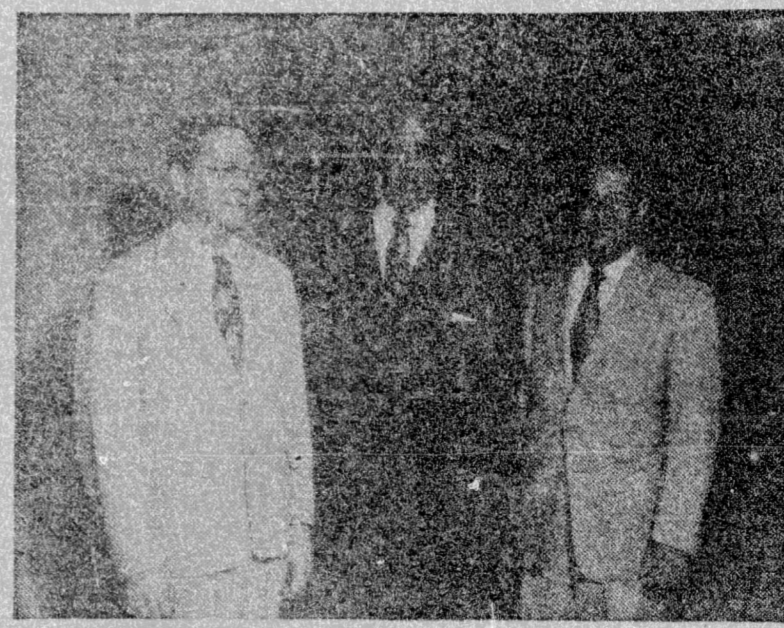
