Wake County derived its name from Margaret Wake, wife of Tryon, a Royal Governor in the Colonial period. Created by the General Assembly of 1770 it comprises 294 square miles of land area and is the sixth largest of the one hundred counties of the State. Located in the central part of North Carolina, most of the county lies on the Piedmont Plateau and the remainder on the Coastal Plain.

Wake County has many and varied soils because it lies along the border of the Piedmont and Coastal Plain regions. The Agricultural Program has done much to bring the County into higher production yields and teach people to do for themselves.
