

Wake Forest Is Scene Of Fall Presbyterian Confab;

WAKE FOREST — The annual fall meeting of the Cape Fear Presbytery, a division of the Carolina Synod, Presbyterian Church in the United States of

America, was held at the Spring Street Presbyterian Church here September 16th, with Moderator Elder Malcolm D. Williams presiding, and the Rev. M. S. Branch, vice moderator, assisting.

VETERAN STATED CLERK REPORTS

The venerable Dr. John H. Hayswood of Lumberton, dean of the Presbytery and Synod, is Stated Clerk of the Cape Fear Presbytery. Hayswood has served his charge, Bethany at Lumberton and Pantersford nearby, for more than fifty-five years, and still has one among the best paying fields among the forty-odd churches constituting the Presbytery.

Hayswood gave his report in which he gently but firmly, stated the numbers and urged to set themselves to the task of raising more benevolent and carrying out their duties to the satisfaction of the people. He said the average is \$6.00 per capita, whereas the national average is \$6.00 per member.

CHALLENGE OF THE CHURCH

Dr. J. T. Givens of Charlotte, Synod representative on United Promotion, reviewed the new chart showing the "Challenge" to churches to best themselves about raising the \$18 million budget for the enlarging of the work among two million Presbyterians.
