

Wake Forest Is Scene Of Fall Presbyterian Confab;

WAKE FOREST — The annual fall meeting of the Cape Fear Presbytery, a division of the Catawba Synod, Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, was held at the Spring Street Presbyterian Church here September 16th with Moderator Elder Malcolm D. Williams presiding, and the Rev. M. S. Branch vice moderator, assisting.

VETERAN STATED CLERK REPORTS

The venerable Dr. John H. Baywood of Lumberton, dean of the Presbytery and Synod, is Stated Clerk of the Cape Fear Presbytery. Baywood has served his charge, Bethany at Lumberton and Pamlico nearly, for more than fifty-five years, and still has one among the best paying fields among the forty odd churches constituting the Presbytery.

Baywood gave his report in which he gently, but firmly, entreated the ministers and elders to set themselves to the task of raising more benevolence and recruiting new members into the membership of the Presbyterians. He said, "It costs \$2.20 per capita whereas the national average is \$6.00" he reminded the approximately 50 members.

CHALLENGE OF THE CHURCH

Dr. J. T. Givens of Charlotte, Synod representative on United Promotion, reviewed the new chart showing the "Challenge" to churches to better themselves about raising the \$18 million budget for the enlarging of the work among two million Presbyterians.

Other reports were by Dr. A. H. Prince, Synod Evangelism Chairman; Revs. O. E. Sanders, B. R. Richardson, J. W. Barnette, B. H. Baskerville, and secretary Kornegay and William Hines, treasurer.

Following much discussion, a special committee was named to confer with Mt. Pisgah Church at Rocky Mount regarding some alleged discord existing there, reportedly the outgrowth of procedure during a Communion service in July.


